EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

D.T.S.S. College of Commerce, founded in 1984, is at present permanently affiliated to the University of Mumbai. The College is named after its founder **Shri. Dhirajlal Talakchand Sankalchand Shah** and is popularly known as **Sanskar College** or **D.T.S.S. College of Commerce**.

The vision of the college is to be a universally respected Institution, making quality the defining element of knowledge and education.

The mission of the college is to make higher education accessible to more and more students so that they are able to face challenges of life with positive attitude and to give opportunities for learning to the students through effective teaching plans, implementation and review of year plan, organizing workshops, encouraging the professional faculty, computers with internet facility, reference books, journals, research centres.

One of the vision and an objective of D.T.S.S College is to impart education with a particular aim to enhance students' knowledge and improve their skills in competitive markets.

The stated objectives relating to teaching of the curriculum are achieved by teaching plans made by each teacher for their respective subjects, use of participatory teaching-learning methods, and through feedback obtained by teachers in the classroom.

The organization structure of the college consists of Sanskar Sarjan Education Society, Local Managing Committee [LMC], The Principal, Heads of Departments, Statutory Committees, Committees for Co-curricular and Extra-curricular activities and Students' Council.

Institution's distinctive characteristics are two research centres, ICT based teaching learning process, large numbers of students' are from economically and educationally disadvantaged sections of the society, well qualified and dedicated staff for innovative academic programmes, spacious, well ventilated and illuminated lecture halls, appropriate infrastructure, well-equipped library and gymkhana.

To meet this demand, and after taking proper permission from the Municipal Corporation of Greater Mumbai, the College has recently added two floors which have 12 classrooms and Two elevators.

Our Management is wholeheartedly dedicated to the service of education, including catering to all contemporary requirements.

The college has Research Guidance Centre to facilitate implementation of the research schemes and projects which regularly organizes free seminars for research scholars and enthusiasts. Experts are invited as resource persons to increase the understanding of different aspects of research. The college has a well defined policy to promote research. All the faculty members are actively involved in publication of research papers and participate in international national and state level conference.

The innovative and interactive sessions have generated an increasingly positive response



and D.T.S.S. College Research Guidance Centre looks set to be a guiding light for aspiring research scholars of the area, and proposes to expand its scope and reach in the coming years.

Campus recruitment drives are organized wherein the organizations make presentations about their -functioning and needs, conduct aptitude tests, group discussions and personal interviews as part of their selection process. The institution organizes courses on personality development. Remedial coaching is provided for weaker, minority and reserved category students. The institution makes special efforts to reach out to students who are differently-abled.

The college makes conscious efforts to promote institution-neighbourhood-community network through various activities conducted by the NSS unit. A unit of Department of Life Long Learning and Extension (L.L.E.) is actively participating in the college from past few years. Several social initiatives such as blood donation, Thalassaemia detection camp, free rubella vaccination for female students are organised every year in the college campus. The students are encouraged to participate in Intercollegiate and Inter- University extracurricular activities including sports and games.

D.T.S.S. College of Commerce has organized an International Conference on “India Calling—A World Of Opportunities” (Initiate, Integrate, Innovate) and an International Conference on Multidisciplinary Research On “Global Uncertainty: A Great Opportune Moment for Indian Economy”. Also National Conference to create awareness about Gujarati Literature was organized by Gujarati Sahitya Mandal.

The college follows a policy of continuously upgrading the infrastructure in the premises in order to facilitate the environment for effective teaching and learning. The college has been making enhancement to existing infrastructure as per requirements of increasing academic needs.

To guide the students to shape their career for higher education and placement assistance various guidance cells like The Career Guidance, The Placement Cell, The Counselling Cell etc are formed. It also extends guidance towards building up the confidence of the students for self-employment and starting up their own ventures. The Cell organizes lectures/seminars by inviting professionals from industry.

College has a Cell known as Women Development Cell (WDC) to prevent sexual harassment of women staff and this Cell also organizes programmes regarding women’s issues for the women staff and students and attends to the problems relating to women staff.

The institution’s action plan for its future development is to have a separate building for Law college, a proposed introduction of M. Phil., M.Sc.IT will be incorporated and an additional division of F.Y.B.Com.

The Final Accounts of the College are audited every year by our Qualified Chartered Accountant. There is an Internal Audit, Statutory Audit, Government Audit, Academic Audit, Administrative Audit, Gender Audit and Green Audit conducted in the college. This is how our entire financial / economic accounting system is under scrutiny and control.

 1. Teaching plans being made by each teacher for their respective subjects.
 2. Use of participatory teaching-learning methods.
 3. Feedback obtained by teachers in the classroom.

1.2. Academic Flexibility

1.2.1 Specifying the goals and objectives give details of the certificate/ diploma/ skill development courses etc., offered by the institution.

- Keeping in tune with the aim and the objectives of the College on the one hand and to suit the different levels of learners on the other, the College offers a basket of programmes, conventional as well as professional. The College conducts one conventional aided (Bachelor of Commerce - B.Com.) UG Programme. The College also conducts PG Programmes viz. M.Com. in two subjects, viz. Advanced Accountancy and Business Management. The College is recognized to guide students leading to Ph.D. in Commerce and Accountancy.
- In addition to these, the College has introduced five self-financing UG programmes with dimensions of commerce, management and technology - viz., B.Com.-Bachelor of Commerce B.Com. (A & F)-Bachelor of Commerce (Accounting & Finance), B.Com. (B & I)-Bachelor of Commerce (Banking & Insurance), B.M.S-Bachelor of Management Studies, B.Sc. (I.T.)-Bachelor of Science in Information Technology. The curricula of Self-financing Programmes have a distinct blend of conventional and professional courses and provide a variety of pedagogical techniques for efficient and effective implementation of the curricula.
- Add on Certificate and Diploma Courses have been introduced to cater to the specific needs of industry. The objectives of these courses are to enable the students to acquire the required knowledge and skills relating to the vocation of their choice.



- The goal of these courses is to provide the necessary platform to such students to acquire these knowledge and skills at an affordable cost.
- To suit the needs of working students, the College offers services as Personal Contact Programme (PCP) Centre for the Institute of Distance and Open Learning (IDOL) of the University in the subjects of Commerce and Science (Information Technology).
- In all the UG programmes across faculty, the core components of the curricula are combined with applied component. The students have a wide choice of subject combination as core and electives across the faculties of Commerce and Self-financing programmes. Applied component subjects offered in B.Com. and its allied fields as well as I. T. have curricula which support skill-development and thereby enhance employability.

- Although our college does not offer a direct dual degree, we encourage our students to pursue other professional courses like Chartered Accountancy, Company Secretary and Cost Accountancy. The college also provides such students the library and computer laboratory facilities.

Admission:-

1. Admissions are done as per the guidelines of the University of Mumbai. However, there is ceiling of minimum passing percentage: 45% for open category and 40% for reserved category.
2. Only those students who are admitted under reservation quota are entitled to get Scholarship and Free-ship as per the government norms.
3. As per University Norms there is no difference in the admission process from that of the regular B.Com course in terms of the students' eligibility.

Curriculum:-

The curriculum, which is designed by the affiliating university, is specialized. Graduate courses have a semester system (CBSGS) with a minimum of 25% of marks reserved for Internal



Assessment. The post graduate courses also have a semester system (CBSGS) with a minimum of 40% of marks reserved for Internal Assessment. Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) is introduced from the academic year 2016-17.

1.3. Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's



goals and objectives are integrated?

Students are provided with information about job opportunities in banking, insurance, retail, human resource management, and administration and revenue services. They are also given information about add-on courses that can improve their employability.

- The ICT is used by the faculty and students to integrate technology into the teaching-learning process, fostering creativity and making learning interesting and interactive.
- The institution organizes courses on personality development.
- An effort is made to develop research appetite of the students for research by giving them inputs about research writing and taking micro research projects.
- Remedial coaching is provided for weaker, minority and reserved category students.
- Well-equipped library with latest collection of text books and reference books, national and international journals and magazines. Further the library also provides high speed broad band internet connection where students can get access to additional information and knowledge pertaining to their subjects of study and its current developments. Students are provided information about various e-learning courses (MOOCs) which can be accessed by the students at flexible timings and supplement their college degree courses.
- Persons from various fields of the business world are invited as resource persons at seminars.
- The Faculty in Accountancy enhances the critical thinking of students by providing practical exposure to analyse financial statements, tax saving techniques and financial planning. This helps students in seeking jobs and enhances students' professional requirements in becoming the responsible students.
- Students are provided practical exposure on commercial policies by organizing field trips to various organizations.
- After attending faculty enrichment courses, the faculty share the knowledge obtained with students.
- In the subject of Business Law, teaching methods such as discussion on case laws (which appear in national newspapers) are held.
- In the subject of Foundation Course, through seminars organized students get



exposure to various socially relevant issues, which are beyond the syllabus. Discussions on social issues, which appear in the mass media, are analyzed in the classroom wherein students actively participate.

- The faculty in the Economics department aims at providing conceptual clarity of Economic terminology and recent reviews of the world economy
- In the subject of Environmental Studies, the faculty helps the students to create awareness about the environment and sustainable development to reach out to the community around the college.
- In the subject of Mathematical and Statistical Techniques, the faculty helps the students to develop analytical skills thereby sharpening their minds in logical reasoning.
- In the subject of Business Communication, students are equipped to communicate effectively by organizing mock communication development exercises relating to real life job situations.
- In the subject of Advertising students are taught through live examples.
- The program of Commerce employs case study method.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

In addition to the efforts stated above we also enrich the curriculum by giving the students the following additional coaching to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market.

1. Resume writing and interview skills.
2. Seminars exposing students to various professions.
3. Mock interviews.
4. Spoken English and Personality Development.
5. Various co-curricular competitions are organized.
6. Accounting Software packages.
7. Remedial coaching.
8. Alumni support by conducting seminars for enrollment in various courses in universities abroad.

- Seminars have been organized on Women's Issues and the Environment. Subjects from curriculum such as Foundation Course and Environmental



Studies include topic relating to human rights and environment.

- In all seminars and extension lectures conducted in the College the ICT facilities are extensively used.
- ICT facility is available in the library, computer laboratories, conference room, auditorium, lecture halls and the office.

Consistent efforts are made by our faculty to inculcate values which will make our students responsible citizens.

- Blood donation and Thalessemia detection camps are held every year in the college premises. The blood collected is given to Blood Bank.
- Rural Residential Camp under NSS is conducted every year wherein a number of programmes related to social issues are taken up. Students get an insight of rural life and get sensitized.
- Leadership Training Camp is held every year in which one male and one female student participate. The students there after train the other NSS volunteers on how to become a good leader.
- The college has conducted a spoken English and Personality Development course for its students.

CRITERION II: TEACHING-LEARNING AND EVALUATION

2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile:

2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

The College follows the admission procedure prescribed by the University of Mumbai and displayed on its website www.mu.ac.in.

- Notices regarding admission to various courses are also put up on the Notice Boards of the college.
- Prospectus: An annually - updated Prospectus, containing detailed information about the Institution including the rules and regulations, courses available, fee structure, and list of faculty is provided to every admission seeker to the College. This ensures wide publicity of various classes and courses for admission seekers.
- Institutional Website: The Institutional website www.sanskarsarjan.org regularly updates all relevant admission information like number of courses, eligibility criteria, fees structure, number of Seats, list of faculty etc.
- Online Enrolment of the students is done in accordance with University guidelines.
- Banners Displayed: The Banners are displayed in prominent places in the neighborhood to announce admission to various courses.
- The admission committee is formed as per the guidelines of the University of Mumbai.
- The committee supervises and ensures the smooth admission process as per the detailed guidelines issued by the university and the government.
- After scrutinizing the applications for admissions a Master List is prepared.
- Merit lists are prepared on the basis of the master list and prominently displayed on the college notice board.
- The first three merit lists of admissions are sent to the University.
- The number of admission seekers every year is more than the number of seats available for various courses. In last 4 years, number of division in F.Y. B.Com & S. Y. B.Com & T.Y. B.Com has increased. This proves the success of the college admission procedure.
 - i. Admission in accordance with University norms.
 - ii. First preference is given to in house students.
 - iii. Recognized as a Linguistic Minority Institution, 50% seats are reserved for minority community.
 - iv. Of the balance seats, students from the open category, reserved category and other categories (Ex-serviceman, sports, etc.) are given admission on the merit basis as per the respective percentage prescribed by the University and the Government.



- v. To ensure transparency, all admission related information is provided to the University of Mumbai
- iv. Preference is given to those students who have some credentials in the field of sports and other extracurricular activities
- v. Admissions at T.Y.B.Com are carried out on the basis of student's performance in the respective subject at First and Second Year levels.
- vi. Admissions to the Post Graduate courses are given according to the prescribed norms of the University.
- vii. Admissions to the Self Financing Courses are given according to the prescribed norms of the University.

Under Graduate Section-Self-financing courses:

- Admission procedure followed for the aided course is replicated for the Self-financing courses, except that, after admission of the In-house students, the rest of the students are given admissions on merit.

Post Graduate Section:

- The admission process is based on merit as per the University guidelines.

2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i)merit (ii)common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii)combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmers of the Institution.

- From the academic year 2008-2009 the University of Mumbai has introduced the system of online enrolment for the Under-graduate courses in various colleges affiliated to it.
- The University of Mumbai website www.mu.ac.in provides detailed guidelines regarding admission of students to the 3 year Under-graduate programs.
- The University informs the entire admission schedule to the college which has general guidelines about:
 - Date of issue of forms for the admission to a particular course.
 - Date of submission of forms for the course.
 - Schedule for In-house admission and minority quota admission.
 - Reservation Quota.
- Students' who have passed standard XII decides which college they would like to enroll in.
- Enrolment does not ensure admission.
- Admission takes place at the college level, using the enrolment list provided to the colleges by the University of Mumbai.
- Once the student is admitted by the college, the University is intimated about which of the enrolled students in fact took admission.



- The same enrollment number is used while intimating the University of Mumbai.
- For all In-house students applying for admission for the B.Com (aided) course, admission is given if they apply within the stipulated date.
- Thereafter, admissions for the minority quota and reservation category are done on merit basis.
- The same guidelines are followed for the admission in Self-financing Courses and Post-graduate courses. However there is no In-house quota for these courses.
- To ensure transparency, all admission related information is provided to the University of Mumbai.
- The University website provides information about our college as one of the recognized Research Centers in Commerce and Accountancy. Students who wish to pursue Ph.D. apply to the college research centre after qualifying the entrance examinations –PET/NET/ SET/ JRF/ M.Phil. or having five years of teaching experience. The admission process is completed after conducting interviews and eligible students are given admissions as per the University guidelines.

The admission to the degree course is done in accordance with the university norms. As we have a Junior College attached to our Degree College, the first preference is given to the in-house students for the admission to First Year B.Com. In some cases, preference is given to those students who have some credentials in the field of sports and other extra-curricular activities at the State and National level. The vacancies, if any, are filled on the basis of academic merit.

2.1.4 Is there a mechanism in the institution to review the admission process and student profiles annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an effort and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

The admission process is reviewed after the admissions are given and based on the profile of students certain initiatives are taken such as:

- Improvement in the teaching methodology to suit the requirements of students.
- Remedial teaching.
- Provide a safe and secure environment with CCTV cameras.
- A secular atmosphere of the college and a staff which has a tolerance to diversity.
- Introducing ICT.

During the admission process, daily reporting of the seats filled up category-wise, is done by the Admission Committee to the Principal.

Care is taken to ensure that the reserved category students are given admission as per the Government norms, subject to their fulfilling the eligibility conditions.

Vacant seats, if any are filled up by adhering to the University norms.

The college accommodates all the students from the reserved category who fulfill the eligibility criteria for admission.

- As our college is located in one of the poorer suburbs of Mumbai and as most of the students' are from the area around the college, we do reach out to the weaker sections of society.
- Many of the students are first generation college students and therefore come from a disadvantaged background.
- Freeships and scholarships are made available for students belonging to the reserved category as provided for by the Government.
- The office ensures that the Government freeships and scholarship facilities are availed of by personally guiding and informing the students about the same. As filling in the forms to avail this facility is an online process, computers are made available for the same. Students are given all the information and guidance required regarding these free-ship and scholarships so that no student from the reserved category is left out from benefiting from this facility.
- Students from disadvantaged community: The Institution has specific scholarships and freeships for the aid of students from disadvantaged community. Moreover, the teaching and non-teaching staff is ever ready to help and encourage those who are disadvantaged. In general the students are sensitized to the needs and problems of their disadvantaged class –mates.
- Women: The proportion of girl students is significant. The presence of a specific Women Development Cell, lady representative in the Students' Council, special



Physical Education teacher for the girls, central location near the Kurar Police Station, a safe atmosphere and strict discipline and adherence to gender equality in academic as well as extra / co-curricular activities are some of the factors which ensure equity for girl students.

- Economically weaker students: The Institution provides prescribed text books through Book Bank Scheme. There is also provision for providing financial assistance to economically-disadvantaged students. Siddhivinayak Trust Book Bank Scheme also helps the economically backward students. Scholarships are also awarded from the Social Welfare Department, Govt. of Maharashtra, by Association of Non-Government Colleges, Mumbai to the students of our College. There are free ships schemes made applicable to the financially needy students.
- Sports Quota: Our Institution is renowned for encouraging the students who are good in sports. They are given concession in attendance and are also provided with a professional coach for Volley-Ball and Best Physique training.

2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of Students

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The institution makes special efforts to reach out to students who are differently-abled.

- Teachers make a special effort to reach out to such students and intervene if they find such students are being isolated.
- Teachers motivate and pay special attention to the studies of such students
- These students are allowed to use the elevators.
- There is a separate toilet for the differently-abled students on the ground floor of the college with a ramp to access the same.
- A Wheelchair is made available.
- The college entrance has ramps for easy movement of handicapped students.
- As per university examination rules, extra time and a writer facility is provided to the students who are differently-abled.
- Teachers provide class notes to such students.
- Special seating arrangements are made for such students.
- Teachers provide books to such students.
- The Government policy of 3% reservation for such students is followed.



2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

YES, the institution does assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement to the programme. The college has a set mechanism in this regard:

- The performance of students in the last qualifying examination also serves as an indicator regarding where students stand.
- Professors think of various innovative ways of making such an assessment. In tutorials, where the number of students is less i.e. 25 to 30, the assessment of students is done by giving them short and simple exercises which are corrected.
- Teachers make special efforts to understand the academic competence of students and select teaching methods accordingly.
- At the beginning of the course, a few lectures are engaged for teaching basics of the subjects.
- Remedial coaching is planned for students who need additional guidance.
- Additional reference work is planned for advanced learners.
- In the beginning of the academic year an orientation programme is organized for the students in view of prescribed syllabus by the University, Examination pattern, marking system, discipline, attendance and rules and regulations.
- After the process of admission is over and lectures commence, lectures through discussions with the students in the classroom make efforts to assess students' academic and extra/co-curricular capabilities and guide them accordingly.
- Lectures, through their interactions with students make efforts to examine students' clarity on concepts.

2.2.3. What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge/ Remedial/ Add-on/ Enrichment Courses, etc.)

- In the subject of Business Economics, Accountancy, Advertising, Commerce, Business Law and various management subjects, efforts are made to relate the concepts to real life situations whereby students are able to understand how various concepts operate at a practical level.
- The teachers frequently interact with the students by asking questions during the lectures to ensure that they are paying attention and to gauge their proficiency-level. Every year, the teachers identify the students who are weak in certain subjects, and make special attempts to instill confidence in them in the relevant subjects. Remedial coaching is undertaken to bring slow learners up to par with



the rest of the students. Regular tutorials in many subjects like Mathematical & Statistical Techniques, Business Communication, Mathematics and Digital Computer Fundamentals also help in identifying and helping slow learners. “Talent Shows” are conducted by the Students’ Council and by Economics Department to trace the hidden talents and potentialities of the students. For the benefit of students coming from vernacular medium, some concepts are explained in Hindi, Marathi or Gujarati language. For the benefits of advanced learners, special selection of subjects such as Computer Systems & Applications, Direct & Indirect Taxation, etc. are offered at T.Y.B.Com level and Computer Programming at S.Y.B.Com. Level.

- The Institution follows the guidelines of the University in the case of tutorials for the students. There are tutorials for the subjects, Mathematical and Statistical Techniques and Business Communication at First Year B.Com. Level. Mathematics and Digital Computer Fundamentals [DCF] at F.Y.B.Sc. (I.T.)
- For Mathematical and Statistical Techniques, there are 5 lectures and 1 tutorial per week per division. For Business Communication, there are 3 lectures and 2 tutorials per week per division. All the above subjects have 4 batches in a division.
- For Mathematics and Digital Computer Fundamentals [DCF], there are 5 tutorials per subject per semester.
- In every course, a detailed Teaching Plan is made by each subject teacher and is discussed in the department meeting at the beginning of each semester.
- The College has a system of assigning every lecturer as a Class-teacher for a particular division. In this capacity the Class-teacher is responsible for mentoring the students of that particular division in academic as well as other matters. The students are made to feel comfortable in discussing their problems with their class-teacher.
- After each term/ semester examination, the result is analyzed and commented upon for the benefit of the students. Results are informed to the parents in PTA meeting.
- The Class-teacher may also refer any concerned student to the professionally-trained Psychologist appointed by the College.



- The syllabi of the respective courses are discussed in detail and efforts are made to assess the level of the students' knowledge and accordingly strategies are formulated to make them understand the topics in the best possible manner.
- Study tours and field visits are organized to give an opportunity to students to work as a team. By visiting various organizations they widen their world view. They get an opportunity to understand the functioning of various organizations and institutions. Students get innovative ideas and put on their thinking caps
- Case studies are used in various subjects to testify theories and thereby help students to relate theory to practice.
- Skills of students in areas such as communication, problem solving, analysis, logical thinking and computing are enhanced through the courses taught.

2.2.4 How does college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college conducts orientation programmes for the First Year students at the beginning of the academic year to make them aware of the various student support services in the college as well as various activities to be conducted during the year.

Students are told about the general discipline of the college and their role as student of the college

- Students are made aware of the Grievance Committee, Women's Development Cell of the college where they can register their complaints to seek the solutions to their problems.
- The Women's Development Cell (WDC) generates awareness among the students and staff on various women's issues. The WDC forwards suggestions to the college authorities which help our institution to reach out to our women students we have a suggestion box where students can drop their suggestions/grievances in writing.
- The Women's Development Cell (WDC), the college NSS unit and seminars in Foundation Course make a focused effort to generate an awareness on women's issues.

- Classroom teaching and co-curricular activities in several subjects provide a formal platform to faculty to discuss issues of gender inclusion and environment.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/ learning needs of advanced learners?

- The faculty identifies advanced learners based on their results, through their interactions and discussions with students and question answer sessions. Students pose several questions in the process of doing their assignments. These doubts reflect the students' abilities e.g. after being given references on topics, if students read up and are enthused to do further reading, there are lectures guide them. Students are taken to the library, assisting them to browse through relevant material on the subject. Web links are also provided.
- Guidance lectures are arranged for B.Com and its allied streams students in order to score maximum marks at the university examinations. Intermittently the students are reminded and guided about credit based evaluation at the university examinations

- Most of the students of our college come from vulnerable socio-economic backgrounds. Many of them are also first generation college students. Those who do not perform well are personally counseled with a view to helping them to perform better academically.
- Attendance is taken at every lecture and teachers make a note of students who remain absent for any lectures. If required, their parents are called and both student and parents are counseled.

2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

TEACHING AND LEARNING:



1. At the beginning of the academic year various committees are finalized. These committees meet and have discussions amongst themselves and with student volunteers to decide the future course of action.
2. Moreover, the Heads of the departments hold periodic meetings with the other members to discuss the syllabus in detail. The syllabus is apportioned among the teachers of the department. A month-wise teaching plan of every department and every teacher within the department is prepared for each term on the reopening of the College. Also, study material prepared by the teachers is provided to students in many subjects.
3. A staff meeting is held in the beginning of the academic year. In a brain storming session best ways of implementing plans are discussed.
4. An Academic Calendar is prepared.
5. All the departments plan their teaching schedule and programmes based on these dates.
6. The faculty submits teaching plans to their heads of the department at the beginning of every academic year.
7. At the end of each academic session, each department holds a review meeting. Future plans are also discussed.
8. Various co-curricular activities are planned and implemented by the departments.
9. Students are well informed about the activities / workshops/seminars which are conducted in the college through notices, posters and teachers making announcements in the class. Notices are circulated in each class room for this purpose.
12. The Examination Committee, Cultural Committee and other committees of the college after having meetings with the Principal, finalize their schedules, keeping in mind the university exams. These dates are announced through notices and in meetings

EVALUATION:

- The faculty follows the criteria laid down by the university while evaluating students.
- The syllabus and question paper pattern is communicated to the students in the beginning of the academic year by each course teachers.
- Examinations are conducted as per the rules and guidelines laid down by the University of Mumbai



- Question papers are set by the faculty following the patterns provided by the University.
- Time Tables for all examinations are displayed well in advance on student and staff notice boards.
- Examination related circulars which are received from the university are circulated to faculty members and explained to students and are discussed in meetings as and when required
- To reduce the use of unfair means, students are given counseling and instructions not to indulge in unfair practices and made aware of the consequences of doing so. Action is taken against the candidates resorting to unfair means as per University guidelines.
- Orientation programmes for students and parents have been organized at the beginning of the academic year to make them aware of the examination system, student support services and other important issues like discipline and attendance
- The university has assigned marks for class participation and a class test apart from semester end examinations Internal evaluation of our
- Student takes into consideration the students progression from the beginning of the semester to the end of the semester.
- Subject teachers provide model answers and synoptic answers to maintain uniformity and objectivity in assessment.
- Assessed examination papers are moderated as per the University guidelines.
- The results are reviewed with the faculty for necessary additional efforts required in improving teaching.

- The post-graduate students are generally employed and thus the college time table is adjusted as per their convenience.
- There is a newly-renovated and spacious auditorium where seminars are organized for the benefit of the students.



- The large Library is well-equipped with computers and Internet connectivity. The Library annually adds to its stock the latest books as recommended by the teaching faculty. The Library also subscribes to over 90 periodicals. The students are encouraged to use all available knowledge resources to enrich their understanding of different subjects. Printed notes & study-material is given to the students in many subjects. Power Point presentations are given in various subjects like Direct & Indirect Taxation , M.P.P [Management & Production Planning & Mathematical and Statistical Techniques. - Some of the students face problems such as low confidence, inability to concentrate



while studying and inability to comprehend topics. Teachers make significant efforts to explain topics in a simple and lucid way to reach out to such students. They are called separately to discuss problems and are assisted in every possible manner to solve their problems.

- Punctuality and regularity in the lectures is emphasized to ensure the continuity in understanding the topics which are being taught in the lectures resulting subsequently in better performance.
- The college organizes a State-level Inter-collegiate multi-event Competition annually in order to enable our students improve their competitive, teamwork and networking skills through a shared platform with their peers from across the state. The college had organized visionary Galaxy : A tribute to Dr.A.P.J Abdul kalam, a state level inter collegiate competition,on various issues related to youth,leadership and society,in order to give students more exposure to current events.
- **Tech-world** was first organized by the Dept. of Economics and Foundation Course from 25th to 28th September, 2013 and then again from 9th to 10th January, 2015. Prof. Ramesh Bodhankar was the coordinator. 100 teams from different colleges – 10 from outside Mumbai – participated in the Tech-World exhibition on 25th and 26th September, 2013, on the theme “Misuse of Science”. Many teams from different colleges across Mumbai, and other area of Maharashtra, including Pune and Nanded, participated. The sub-topics were from practical science and information topics like cybercrime, nuclear energy, laser, pollution, biotechnology, etc, for the year 2013-14 and Substitute for natural resources, energy from waste, Hydropower plant, energy plantation, etc, for the year 2014-15.The topics for the PPT presentation competition were India Vision 2020, Interior Designing and medical and health technology. There was an inter-collegiate debate on the topic, “Is the Parliament capable of protecting the rights of women?” There was also a sketching competition on “Misuse of science”. Cash prizes were given to the students. Our students volunteered in various capacities, including organizing the events, competed in several events and made us proud by winning the first prize and the consolation prize in the project exhibition, third prize (shared) and consolation prize in the PPT presentation. In January 2016, the competition was renamed **Visionary Galaxy: A Tribute to Dr. A.P.J. Abdul Kalam** and the thrust of the competitions was on leadership skills.
- Special guidance lectures have been organized by the Commerce and Economics Forum



by inviting resource persons from other Colleges to advise our students regarding how to excel in examinations. All the third year B.Com students benefit from these guidance lectures.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

- Our teachers undertake the lecture method as well as other interactive methods for teaching. Our teachers organize seminars and group discussions. Field trips and visits are also organized and this helps the students to gain practical knowledge. Often the teachers arrange for power-point presentations to aid their lectures. Slide projectors, internet inputs, subject-related film shows are also incorporated in the teaching-learning process. In some subjects, seminars and guest lectures by subject experts on various core areas are also organized. INTERNET facility is made available to the



students and teachers for enhancement of their knowledge.

- Viva is conducted in the B.B.I.,B.M.S,B.Sc.(IT),M.Com,
- All the self-financed courses follow a range of teaching – learning methods, which are used by the faculty.
- **Projects and Presentations:** - The students participate in group as well as individual projects. The students make presentations on the same to the respective subject teachers who submit an internal assessment report.
- **Home and Class Assignments:** - The students are given questions on which they have to write the required answers and submit them to the teachers.
- **Group discussions:** - Group discussions are held to bring out the pros and cons of the subject under discussion.
- **Tests:** - Class Tests are conducted periodically. Thus is especially undertaken in technical subjects to strengthen their conceptual understanding.
- **Viva-voce:** - Sometimes questions are asked from specific chapters to sharpen the students' conceptual knowledge and to build in them the confidence to face interviews.
- **Interviews:** - The students are made to take interviews with stalwarts in the industry and share their learning and experience. Mock-interviews are taken in Effective Communication subject-tutorials to improve the students' communication skills.
- **LCD projectors:**-The institution has encouraged the facility to use ICT in the teaching-learning process by acquiring 8LCD projectors. The impact of the innovative teaching methods mentioned above has been confirmed by feedback received from the students.

Due to the innovative methods of teaching mentioned above, the College results (impact) are observed:

1. Pass percentage of student is increasing.
2. The students get practical experience of field work which enhances their learning skills and development of personality.
3. The students can face the challenges in job market more confidently.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching - learning process?

The college library is a storehouse of information and has a wealth of enriching options offering students an exposure to recent debates.

- Our College has a well equipped Library which is computerized. It has an excellent and ever-growing collection of a variety of books conveniently categorized department wise. These books help immensely in improving teaching and learning. Apart from B.Com.,the self-financing courses, i.e. - B.Com. (Banking & Insurance] and B.Com. (Accounting and Finance), B.Sc. (IT) , B.M.S. and Post Graduation courses also have their separate sections in the Library useful for their faculty and students.
- Faculty members regularly use the library resources to update their knowledge in order to prepare teaching material.



- At the beginning of the academic year new entrants are given an orientation regarding how to use the library facilities and resources.
- Students are given information of reference books available in library through OPAC.
- The college library organizes a book exhibition. This gives students and faculty a good exposure to a variety of new writings.
- There is a new arrival section in the library which showcases books recently added to the library.
- Educational CD's are available in the library.
- The internet and various e-learning resources are made available to students free of cost.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the Challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

- It is always challenging to complete the curriculum within a stipulated time frame because of the short duration of semesters, exhaustive evaluation pattern, public holidays and other administrative work. We meet these challenges by taking extra lectures.
- when deputed on election duty during the course of the academic year, makes it difficult for teachers to complete the given curriculum within the stipulated time.
- The faculty makes special efforts to complete the curriculum by distributing handouts and sharing other reference study material with students to meet this challenge.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

Yes, the College has introduced evaluation of the teachers by the students at every level, i.e. - at F.Y., S.Y. and T.Y. level and at the exit level for the Commerce graduates. The students' feedback is taken on a regular basis through an elaborately prepared questionnaire. The feedback forms are analyzed and a report is prepared. If the reports are not satisfactory about the performance of a teacher in his / her respective subject, the Principal has one-to-one discussion with him / her in order to improve his / her performance.

- An analysis of the subject-wise results is done and discussed at the department level as well as in the staff meetings. The subject-wise analysis of the results serves as an indicator of the areas which need improvement. Teachers take corrective steps where required.
- Regular feedback and interaction with the students helps in improving the quality of teaching learning process.
- Heads of department regularly observe the lectures engaged by the members of their department.
- Suggestions given in the Student Feedback Forms help in improving the quality of teaching-learning by implementing suggestions which benefit students.

- Heads of departments confirm that the syllabus is completed effectively and timely as per teaching plan given by departmental members in the beginning of the Semester.
- Heads of departments hold meetings with colleagues in the department at the beginning and end of the academic year to discuss various aspects related to teaching - learning of their respective subject.
- After every internal and external examination, the teachers in each department analyze the results and think of ways to improve the same.

These efforts contribute to:

- Guiding the individual subject teacher.
- Initiating remedial action for slow and average learners.
- Devising plans for advanced learners so that they can perform even better.
- The Principal monitors the teaching methodology.
- The discipline committee looks after the discipline of the college. The entire staff constantly makes efforts to ensure that discipline is maintained.
- The college management liaisons with the Principal / Heads of Department to monitor the quality of teaching.
- Feedback is collected from students regarding the performance of teachers and teachers are given constructive suggestions based on this feedback.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum.

- In the case of recruitments, the college follows the guidelines given by the State Government, the University of Mumbai and the University Grants Commission (UGC) while appointing teachers. To begin with, a No Objection Certificate is obtained from the Joint Director ,Higher Education, Mumbai Region, getting the draft advertisement approved by the University of Mumbai. The vacancy is then advertised in one leading national and a regional (Marathi) newspaper. We being a minority institution, the management constitute the selection committee. Candidates are selected purely on merit. The teaching faculty is from diverse back-grounds.
- A democratic work culture of the institution helps in retaining the faculty. Time tables are adjusted according to the convenience of visiting faculty.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome during the last three years.

- The city of Mumbai is an educational hub. As our college is located in the suburbs and is not very far from the centre of the city, the college gets good resource persons from reputed educational & professional institutions to interact with our students in seminars, workshops and guest lectures on topics which add value to the syllabus.
- The time table of the Visiting faculty is adjusted as per their convenience.
- The college caters to students of Commerce, Management and Information Technology. The faculty members are professionals drawn from these fields.
- Teachers keep abreast with developments in their subjects and use it in their teaching.
- To cope up with the growing demand for teachers the selection of staff is done by following university procedures.
- On the basis of the Heads of Department (HOD) and teachers' suggestion relevant literature on new topics are sought for and necessary books, journals etc are recommended for purchase by the college library.

2.4.3 Providing details on staff development programmes during the last four years elaborate on the strategies adopted by the institution in enhancing the teacher quality.

Our college management encourages teachers in their professional development in various ways:

- Duty leave is given to teachers for attending seminars, conferences and workshops.
- The college encourages teachers to participate in Orientation courses, refresher courses, short term courses and training programmes by providing them information on the schedules of these programmes.
- Registration fees for participating in workshops, seminars and conferences are reimbursed.
- The newly recruited faculty are welcomed by the institution in the staff meeting and introduced to the entire faculty and the facilities of the college. In departmental meetings, orientations are given to the faculty who has newly joined.
- ICT infrastructure, departmental libraries, subscription to online learning resources enables teachers to keep abreast of latest developments in their subjects.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers?

If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching - learning process?

- The teachers have been evaluated by the students periodically using the five-point evaluation scale. The students have been given confidential evaluation forms that are distributed in the class for the respective teacher's assessment.
- As per the guidelines provided by the Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) the college also gives importance to the feedback provided by the External Peer Groups.
- All teachers are required to fill up a Self -Appraisal report at the end of the year. These forms are submitted through their respective Heads of the Department (HODs) who act as internal peers in monitoring a teacher's progress.
- On receiving feedback from students, the HOD personally gives constructive feedback to the concerned teacher.
- Senior faculty members from neighboring colleges are invited as moderators. It provides us with valuable feedback and suggestions on the papers set and assessment done.
- Improvement in the teacher’s performance is monitored by the Principal, Heads of the Department and the IQAC.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

- The College prospectus gives details of the method of student evaluation used at different levels. Besides, an orientation Programme is arranged for the fresh entrants at the beginning of the year, where the information about the College is communicated to them. To ensure proper understanding of these evaluation methods by the students, all the teachers communicate this information to them at the beginning of the academic year. The evaluation methods framed by the University are strictly followed by the College in all respects.
- In the present Examination system, there are two term-end examinations of 100 marks each at the level of F.Y.B.Com & S.Y.B.Com. Self-financing courses have a semester system where there are semester-end examinations of 100 marks (60 marks – Theory &



40 marks – Internal Assessment). Many subjects in the B.Com. Courses have provisions of Internal Assessment, which allows the examiner to monitor the students' progress.

- At T.Y.B.Com. Level, subjects like Direct & Indirect Taxation, Labour Welfare, Computer Systems & Applications, & Export Marketing have Internal Assessment of 25 marks; Moreover Preliminary Examinations are conducted to assess students' progress.
- The Institute conducts P.T.A. meetings, where the performance of the students is communicated to their parents.
- Moreover, the class teachers take care of the academic performance of the students and counsel them whenever necessary
- When the University introduced Credit Based Semester Grading System (CBSGS) in 2011-12 our faculty attended the workshop on the same and shared the learning gained with colleagues through a workshop in the college.
- Any circular related to evaluation method is sent to the examination committee which circulates the same to the faculty members.
- The circular is also put up on the notice board for the students and faculty.
- The faculty and students are encouraged to access the University Of Mumbai Website for information related to examination.
- Evaluation procedure is communicated to the faculty in staff meeting that is held at the beginning of the year.
- An orientation is conducted for the new students at the beginning of the year to communicate evaluation procedure.
- In addition to this, the lecturers also explain the evaluation method to the students in their respective classes.
- The faculty and college administration access the University website regularly on their own and provide information to students about changes taking place in evaluation and about syllabi.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

- The University has introduced the CBSGS since 2011-12 and it has been adopted by the college.
- The students are made aware of the provisions regarding revaluation and obtaining photocopies of their answer sheets as per the guidelines given by the University.
- The recent examination reforms introduced by the university and implemented by the college include:
- The new question paper pattern has replaced descriptive questions with objective questions. Students are made aware of this change and they are trained well to succeed.
- The university has devised the internal evaluation procedures which have contributed to the continuous evaluation of students.



- An additional exam is conducted for students who are not able to appear for regular exams for reasons such as representing the college at the University level for sports and cultural events, on medical grounds or having failed in the regular examination.
- M.Com students are assigned projects on various topics as per the University guidelines and these projects are evaluated by the internal and external examiner.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The Principal and Heads of the Departments with the help of the administrative staff of the Institution, ensure effective implementation of these reforms by:

- a. Conducting the University examinations, strictly according to the norms prescribed by the University
- b. Assigning separate examination seat numbers
- c. Strictly following the system of centralized assessment
- e. Declaring the result well within the stipulated time by the University.

We have formed Grievances Redressal Cell as per the University requirement. We follow all the instructions given by the University, such as,

- a. Allowing the students to apply for marks verification.
- b. Giving the photocopy of the answer book to the students who apply for it.
- c. Allowing the students to apply for reevaluation.
- d. Taking the opinion of the Committee constituted for the purpose to ascertain whether the candidate who has applied for reevaluation has any merit or not.
- e. Getting the answer book re-assessed (if recommended by the Committee). The result of evaluation is communicated to the candidate concerned.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

As an affiliated college of the University of Mumbai, we have adopted an evaluation system as per the guidelines of the University.

- The Credit Based Grading System was introduced from the academic year 2011-12.
- As a result, the system of awarding internal marks to students based on class participation, written test and assignments started.
- The University followed 60-40 evaluation pattern under which 40 marks were allocated for internal assessment and 60 marks for external examination. Formative assessment of students included 40 marks.
- From the academic year 2014-15, the above mentioned evaluation pattern has been modified to 75- 25 marks.
- A summative examination of 75 marks (prior to 2014-15 the marks allotted for the semester end examination for 60 marks) is conducted at the end of the semester
- From the academic year 2016-17, the above mentioned evaluation pattern once again modified to 100 marks under Choice Based Credit & Grading System (CBCGS)



- Besides the class tests, students participate in activities conducted by the departments which also gives them an opportunity to develop their faculties.
- The marks obtained in the internal assessment then form a part of the total marks which will be obtained by the students after appearing for the semester examination.
- As a result of the internal assessment, teachers are able to assess performance of the students and reach out to them to improve upon areas where they face problems.
- The semester end examination results are an indication regarding how much students have been able to grasp, retain and reproduce.

The following measures are taken in order to help students perform better:

- Holding class tests.
- Conducting group discussions.
- Solving of past question papers.
- Giving projects and assignments.
- Giving handouts of synopsis of various topics.
- Monitoring students' attendance.
- Revision Exercises.
- Monitoring students' behavior.
- Remedial Teaching.
- Spoken English Course under Remedial teaching scheme of the UGC

2.5.5 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/ programme? Provide an analysis of the student's results/ achievements (Programme/ course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/ courses offered.

The track record of progress and performance of each student is communicated through individual semester-end mark sheet and consolidated mark sheet. It is also displayed on the examination and students notice board.

In the case of first year and second year classes the mark sheets help teachers in counselling students in case they have not fared well.

Faculty repeatedly conveys to the students that excelling in each semester is important as the graduation degree reflects their cumulative performance of all the six semesters under the CBSGS.

Continuous Internal assessment is done by teachers in assessing students.

- Teachers record the performance of students in the class tests and overall behavior of students including their active participation in the class.
- Internal assessment is one of the components of existing evaluation system of the university. To ensure transparency; teachers maintain the records of attendance of class test, submission of assignments and marks allotted to the students in the internal assessment. Teachers refer to those records as and when required to resolve the issues related to internal assessment and submit the same to the examination committee.
- The post graduate and under graduate students of self financing courses are apprised of the internal assessment system which also involves viva voce by the external examiners.

2.5.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student, performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Yes

- Under the existing evaluation system students' performance is evaluated on the basis of both semester examinations and internal assessment.
- Classroom participation and overall behavior and attitude of the student are an indicator for evaluating students' performance in internal examination.
- Those students who take efforts and get good scores in internal evaluation, most often also do well in the theory papers as a result of their consistent efforts and rewards.



- To some extent, the feedback given by students in various subjects helps in making necessary changes in teaching methods. Students who are average or below average score well by attending classes regularly.
- Remedial teaching has helped students to improve their performance in examinations.

2.5.8 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and University level?

- We have formed Grievances Redressal Cell as per the University requirement. We follow all the instructions given by the University, such as,
 - a. Allowing the students to apply for marks verification.
 - b. Giving the photocopy of the answer book to the students who apply for it.
 - c. Allowing the students to apply for revaluation.
 - d. Taking the opinion of the Committee constituted for the purpose to ascertain whether the candidate who has applied for revaluation has any merit or not.
 - e. Getting the answer book re-assessed (if recommended by the Committee).

The result of evaluation is communicated to the candidate concerned.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Does the college have clearly stated learning outcomes? If 'yes' give details on how students and staff are made aware of these?

Yes, the learning outcomes of the college are:

- Fundamental knowledge of subjects taught.
- Acquiring soft skills such as analytical skills, presentation skills, a positive attitude and a sense of confidence.
- Ability to apply knowledge acquired in real life situations.

The Learning Outcomes of a graduate for each subject are defined.

The Learning Outcomes are discussed in staff meetings and departmental meetings and subsequently communicated to the students in the classroom.

2.6.2 How are the teaching, learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes?

- The teaching plan is determined by the number of lectures allocated for the different modules of the syllabus by the University of Mumbai. Teachers make a teaching plan based on the number of working days and number of lectures and tutorials available in every semester. Keeping in mind the level of students, the syllabus and objectives of the course, the teachers make a teaching plan.
- Extra lectures are taken whenever required. At the beginning of the academic year a staff meeting is held to decide strategies regarding teaching, learning and assessment.
- Departmental meetings also discuss the learning outcomes.
- Timetables are made for lectures and tutorials.

- Later in the academic year a schedule for remedial teaching is worked out and implemented for weaker students.
- Advanced learners are guided by the faculty based on their area of interest in the subject.
- Teachers explain concepts and topics in as simple a way as possible relating theory to the real world.
- Apart from the lecture method, other teaching methods used are: Quiz Competitions role-plays and subject related competitions.
- Field visits and Industrial visits/ tours are organized.
- Presentations are made by the students in the classroom.
- The institution organizes seminars.
- Students are given problems to solve based on the theory they study.

2.6.3 What are the measures/ initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality Jobs, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered?

- The college has taken various initiatives within the course and syllabi structure of the University to enhance the social and economic relevance of the courses offered at the undergraduate and post graduate level.
- Projects are designed in a manner that students get an exposure to the practical aspects of the theories learnt in classroom teaching. This enhances their knowledge and employability.
- Seminars and conferences are organized on topics and issues of social relevance such as protection from environmental degradation, gender sensitization etc. It contributes to bringing an attitudinal change in the society.
- The college has taken initiatives in organizing campus recruitment drives, skill development courses and personality development programmes to enhance employability of students.

Prof. Ramesh Bodhankar was the coordinator for the four-day programme. 100 teams from different colleges – 10 from outside Mumbai – participated in the Tech-World exhibition on 25th and 26th September, on the theme "Misuse of Science". The sub-topics were cybercrime, nuclear energy, laser, biotechnology, ultra-sonography machine and pollution. Our college students won the second and the third prizes at the exhibition.



On 27th and 28th September, there was an inter-collegiate debate on the topic, “Is the Parliament capable of protecting the rights of women?” 15 teams from various colleges participated, including 6 teams from colleges outside Mumbai. Our college students won the Consolation prize at the debate.

The programme was the first-of-its-kind held by our college, and received enthusiastic response from students across colleges. The department plans to make it an annual event.

2014-15

Tech –world is a state level inter collegiate competition organized by the dept of economics and foundation course from 9th to 10th January 2015. Prof Ramesh Bodhankar was the coordinator for the two day programme. He was ably supported by a team of committed student volunteers. Many teams from different colleges across Mumbai, and other area of Maharashtra ,including Pune and Nanded, participated in this year Tech world.

This year, the subtopic for the project were Substitute for natural resources, Hydropower plant, energy plantation ,Big bang Theory, Physics in centripetal force, Electricity from garbage’s and awareness for healthy environment . The winners got cash prizes of Rs 15000, Rs 10000 and Rs 8000 respectively. The topics for the PPT presentation competition were India Vision 2020, interior Designing ad medical and health technology. The winners took home prizes of Rs 2500 ,Rs 2000 and Rs 1500 each.

There were lively inter collegiate debates on the topics “Is the parliament effective without strong opposition?” and “Should taxes be centralized?” The winners were awarded Rs 4000, Rs 3000 and Rs2000. There was a quiz on current affairs and general knowledge where the winner got Rs 3000 award .Lastly, to explore the artistic talent of students there was a sketching competition on “Misuse of science”, where the winners got Rs 2500 ,Rs 2000 and Rs 1000 each.

Our students made us proud by winning the first prize and the consolation prize in the project exhibition , third prize (shared) and consolation prize in the PPT presentation.

The programme was the second successful such event held by our college and received enthusiastic response from students and faculty across colleges

Phil., and Ph.D.

- The faculty share their research findings and knowledge acquired at seminars and conferences with colleagues in staff meetings.
- Conference proceedings have been published for the International conferences organized by the college to disseminate the research findings.

- There is no provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research.

- The college provides funds to support research activities. Funds are utilized to acquire infrastructure like computers, internet facilities, Wi-fi, printers, photocopiers etc. and to pay membership fees of other institutions and libraries such as INFLIBNET.
- The college has also provided the students with paid database links, Full-text-E-resources, Bibliographic database ICFAI Journals, Free databases, Open Access database, students corner, Library links, etc/
- Book Exhibition is organized in the library. All faculty members and students are encouraged to select reference books. The recommended books are purchased by the college for library and the Research Centre which can be used for research.
- Students as well as the faculty have access to a large number of books, journals and web resources to carry out their research.
- Students are encouraged to participate and present papers at seminars and conferences. The faculty provides guidance to prepare research papers.

3.3 Research Facilities

3.3.1 What are the research facilities available to the students and research scholars within the campus?

- To inculcate research aptitude of students the college has provided following facilities:
- A Research Centre with ICT facilities.
- A separate space for research material in the library.
- Six research supervisors.



- Students and the faculty doing research have access to books, journals, newspapers.
- Web resources in the library.

- The institution is planning to expand its research activities by increasing the number of research centres and research programs.
- The research centres are increasing the number of supervisors.
- In the beginning of the academic year, the institution reviews the existing learning resources such as books, journals and technological support and plans the additions which would be needed to give a boost to research.
- ICT and academic infrastructure is being upgraded to meet the needs of researchers.
- Adequate funds will be allocated to purchase books and other academic infrastructure necessary for research.

3.3.3 Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facilities? If 'yes', what are the instruments / facilities created during the last four years?

- On 20th February 2015, the college had organized 'International Conference on India Calling-A World of Opportunities (initiative, integrate, innovate) in association with Dept. of Commerce, University of Mumbai at Kalina campus University of Mumbai.
- The college has provided adequate facilities for researchers such as books, journals and ICT facilities. To fund research projects the college will be applying for grant from the UGC and other institutions.

3.3.4 What are the research facilities made available to the students and research scholars outside the campus / other research laboratories?

- The college makes available the research facilities outside the campus in various other institutions viz. Jawaharlal Nehru Library of University of Mumbai, Hinduja College, Indira Gandhi Institute of Developmental Research (IGIDR), J M Patel College, Nagindas Khandwala College etc. to enable the Researchers to access as well as to borrow the research material for their research whenever required.
- The college also provides its faculty and research students with Full-text-E-resources, Bibliographic database through the Paid database of N-LIST from INFLIBNET for which they are provided with the separate passwords by the Librarian to access the same.
- Free databases, Open Access databases, student's corner, Library links etc. are provided in the college library website created by the librarian (<http://libraryatsankarsarjan.webs.com/>), which the Researcher can access from anywhere outside the campus.



- The college has established linkages with other institutions and libraries such as - INFLIBNET and many others and some financial institutions to enable our faculty and students to access their resources.
- The college has also provided the students with Paid database links, Full-text-E-resources, Bibliographic database ICFAI Journals, Free databases, Open Access database, student's corner, Library links, etc.

- The college has a separate PhD Cabin where there is a seating arrangement of four PhD Guides at present, for Research Guidance. Though we do not have a separate section for the Researchers in the library, separate cupboard is available for books purchased under this section. Moreover, the researchers are allowed to use the Teacher's Reading Area, in the library for their study, if needed.
- In the library's website the librarian has provided a separate page as "Study & Research" in which Paid database links, Full-text-E-resources, Bibliographic database, Free databases, Open Access databases, student's corner, Library links and various other important linkages, etc. are provided for the Researchers.
- The librarian and Assistant Librarian help the Faculty & Researchers in finding relevant material for their research every time they need from the Internet.
- Separate computer facility with free Internet connection is also provided for the Researcher, when needed
- The college faculty can make use of facilities provided by other libraries for their research through Inter Library Loan. Many times our staff and students has benefitted using IGIDR library, which is nearby, and also JNL, University of Mumbai through ILL.
- The college subscribes to membership of resource rich libraries. The college staff and students can make use of facilities provided by these libraries for their research projects.
- The college has established linkages with other institutions and libraries such as - INFLIBNET and many others and some financial institutions to enable our faculty and students to access their resources.
- The college has also provided the students with Paid database links, Full-text-E-resources, Bibliographic database ICFAI Journals, Free databases, Open Access database, student's corner, Library links and various other linkages, etc.

Facilities available for Curricular and Co-curricular activities:

- Good Campus with playground.
- All the Infrastructure facilities are utilized efficiently. The Institute follows shift system to put the available physical structure to optimum use. Junior College is also attached to the Institution.
- Regular Classes and some of the self-financing courses are functioning in the morning hours and Junior College is functioning in the afternoon.
- College has Degree College from 7.00am to 12.00 noon, Junior College from 12.00 noon to 5.00 pm and IDOL-, B.Sc.IT, MCA,B.Com ,M.Com and regular M.Com lectures in the late evening and on Sundays.
- Demand for additional classrooms is ever increasing since past 4 years; numbers of divisions are almost doubled. In the academic year 2009-10 we had 4 divisions of F.Y.B.Com., 3 of S.Y.B.Com. and 3 of T.Y. B.Com. Also we had 1 division of F.Y., S.Y. & T.Y. of [BBI] & 1 division of F.Y. & S.Y. [BAF] and 1 division of B.Sc. [IT]. We also had M.Com in Accountancy & in Management. Today we have 4 divisions of



F.Y.B.Com., S.Y.B.Com., and T.Y.B.Com. Also we have 1 division of F.Y., S.Y. and T.Y. of BBI, BAF, BMS and B.Sc. I.T. We also have 2 divisions of M.Com.

- To meet this demand, and after taking proper permission from the Municipal Corporation of Greater Mumbai, the College has recently added two floors which have 12 classrooms. Two elevators have been constructed to enable easy access to the higher floors.

It has given student report with a detailed analysis and suggestive areas of strengths and developments.
- The Career Guidance and Placement Cell of the College not only gives guidance to the students to shape their career for higher education and placement assistance but it also extends guidance towards building up the confidence of the students for self-employment and starting up their own ventures. The Cell organizes lectures/seminars by inviting professionals from industry.
- The college has a Rotaract Club and NSS.

Training on Performing Arts and Theatre (Rangvalay)

- An innovative extra-curricular training introduced by D.T.S.S College, this training teaches the students the basics of acting and the various aspects of dramatics. Conducted in Marathi by Mr. Ansurkar and in Hindi by Mr. Yogesh Joshi, this bi-lingual training helps in improvement of body language, oratorical skills, personality development and confidence building.

Civil Services Cell

- Civil Services Cell was started in D.T.S.S. College from 20/11/2012 in the academic year 2012-13. The main motivating force behind starting this Cell, in our College, is our respected and beloved Principal Dr. M. S. Kurhade, who is the Chairman of this Cell.
- At present 22 students have enrolled their names in this cell. They are studying in BAF, FYJC, F.Y.B.Com, &T.Y.B.Com. They are given free coaching & guidance on “How to prepare for the UPSC examinations” by Ms. Varsha Bomble, who was the Instructor of this Cell. The Librarian Mrs. Yojana Patil, who is the Coordinator of this Cell, helps the students by giving free Library Facilities –Books, Newspapers, Journals & Magazines Issued as instructed by the Chairman.
- At the beginning the Cell conducted a Seminar on UPSC Examination on 25/11/2012 in the Assembly Hall. Students’ response was very good.
- On 15/12/2012 a lecture on “Civil Services Examination” was given by Dr. Yogendra Vakare ,IRSfor the students in the Assembly Hall between 5.00p.m. to 8.00 p.m.
- For student’s personality Development “English Speaking” lecture was conducted on 21st January 2013 by Mr. Alok Jha.

Course on English Speaking



- In today's globally competitive world, speaking English effectively is a cutting-edge skill. To improve the English speaking skills of the students, D.T.S.S College has started a short course on English Speaking.
- Conducted by Mr. Alok Jha, the course focuses on sounds, syllables, syllable stress, formation of words, construction of sentences, reading skills, how to start a conversation, and the basics of interviews.
- Conducted at a nominal fee, the four-week course is held after the examinations so that the students can utilize the holiday period to improve and maximize their spoken English abilities.

Staff members informally help students by providing them personal counseling on one-to-one basis as and when they approach for guidance.

Academic:

- Faculty pays special attention to the needs of advanced learners by recommending reference books from the library.
- Slow learners are advised to join remedial coaching organized by the institution.
- College conducts programmes like workshop on yoga, seminar on stress management etc.

Career:

The Career Guidance and Placement Cell

- Give counselling to students regarding opportunities of higher education and job options available for their course of study.
- Arrange lectures and seminars inviting academicians and industry professionals to create awareness of the current market trends, placements and new courses. They also advise on the additional skills required in industry.
- Faculty from the Department of Accountancy who are Chartered Accountants guide the students to pursue various professional courses.
- Malad Chamber of Tax Consultants organized one-day workshop for third year students to give hands on training for the practical aspects of taxation.
- Career opportunities in insurance sector held on 12.09.2014 conducted by Bajaj Allianz General Insurance Co. Ltd.

The college has invited eminent civil services administrators, creative writers, certified investment planners, practicing advocates, Chartered Accountants and IT professionals and Environmentalists etc. to interact with students.

Personal and Psychosocial:

Counselling Cell

As part of the continuing focus on students' welfare activities, the College had appointed a psychological counselor to help the students deal with personal, academic and stress-related problems. The counseling cell has done the following activities:

- Introduction to all students through class to class visits.



- One-hour lecture for 12th std. students, separately in each class (to find the weakness and strength of students).
- Lecture in 12th commerce classes to give them information about globalization.
- Lecture on importance of education and studies.
- Arranged aptitude test for all students . The Objectives of the test:
 - ✓ To know the IQ level of student
 - ✓ To guide them with best career opportunities
 - ✓ To find their interest areas.
 - ✓ 225 students had participated in aptitude test.
- Meeting degree students in class for discussion of their problems.
- Aptitude result is displayed to all students in the assembly hall.
- Result was displayed in two batches on different days.
- On that day personal attention and explanation gave to each student with suggestion to them regarding career options according to their interests and IQ level
- Personal counselling done to students for their study problems as well as their personal problems.
- Lectures taken for student on stress management
- 51 students showed interest in personal counselling till date.
- MCOM students are also coming for personal counselling since September as they have completed 7 sessions each. Also their parents took initiative with students
- Planning for seminar on stress management.
- Planning to keep small session by outside delegates. (Topic-how to apply for abroad).

Counseling to Students by I.T. Dept.

Department of IT is providing guidance to students of HSC regarding opportunities in science stream. Department also provides counseling to HSC science students regarding scope of science in career and career orientation.

As increasing number of students are benefitting from the services of the Counseling Cell, the college plans to expand its activities in the coming years to reach out to more and more students with a variety of professional and personal counseling-related activities.

In July 2012, representatives of Kingfisher Airlines interacted with F.Y.B. Com students to tell them about career opportunities in the aviation industry. Fly High Academy visited the college to give career counseling lectures and demonstrations for the aviation industry to FY/ SY/TY students. Representatives from NIIT interacted with F.Y.B. Com students to tell them about career opportunities in the



aviation industry. Career Guidance programme for S.Y.J.C students was conducted by Mrs. Mungi. Vidyalkar Dnyanapeeth Trust conducted a student guidance seminar about Career Path after Graduation for students of S.Y.B.Com/T.Y.BAF&T.Y.BBI. In August, MAC Multimedia held workshop on animation for students. A talk was organized on career opportunities for I.T. industry. Get the Edge—an informative career-making seminar organized for T.Y.B.Com students was organized by M.E.T. Guest Lecture on Career Development and Values held by Nihar Jambusaria.

Year 2011-12

The Placement Cell of D.T.S.S College focuses on providing career opportunities to our students and preparing them for the tough and competitive job markets. The Placement Cell interfaces with various companies and placement organizations throughout the year to give the students exposure and opportunities in various industries. In June, 9 students got placement offers from MIAL Ground Services and Jet Airways Ground Services through the Fly High Aviation Academy. In July, Edupoint counseled degree college students on career opportunities and social responsibilities. In August, Kareer Krafters India Pvt. Ltd. counseled T.Y.B. Com students on career opportunities abroad. They collected the students' CVs to post on their website which focuses on international job placement. In August, NIIT counselors addressed F.Y.B. Com students on computer courses and related careers in the fast-growing IT sectors. In September, a seminar on animation and related career prospects was held by Arena Multimedia for degree college students. In November, NEEV 90 TOP 10 workshops on character building were organized by Tej Gyan Foundation for the students of Self-Financing departments. In December, 2011, PeP Biz, Career Net conducted tests and interviews for students of Self-Financing departments for placement in various multi-national companies. This was an initiative by the College Placement Cell which resulted in on-campus job placements for some students. In December, Fly High Aviation Academy gave career counseling lectures to F.Y/S. Y/T. Y students. They also conducted an enrolment drive for training in various careers in the aviation industry. In January, Kingfisher Airlines, in association with the College Placement Cell, gave a lecture on career opportunities in the aviation industry to F.Y/S. Y/T. Y students. Un-cleanliness of class rooms, fan not working in one lecture hall, Tube light not working, improper behavior grievances, administration grievances. All the grievances were settled by the committee.

5.1.11 What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

- The faculty makes concerted efforts to emphasize upon the students the importance of respecting women and creating a safe environment for all of us to live and work in. The college has a 'Women's Development Cell'. It follows the guidelines given by the Central Women's Development Cell at the University level based on the Vishaka Judgment. The procedure for dealing with cases of sexual harassment have been put up on a notice board which is only for women's issues placed just outside the girls' common room on the third floor beside the staircase for girls. The staff is vigilant in the campus and CCTV cameras are installed to prevent such instances.
- Our library has books on the topic of sexual harassment and students are made aware of the same. Students are made aware of the Women's Development Cell and regular programmes conducted by it to empower women and educate them on issues relating to women's safety.
- There have been no cases of sexual harassment on the campus so far.
- We have completed Gender Audit in academic year 2015-16. And suggestions made by the report are implemented.
- Female NSS volunteers organize various programmes exclusively for female students to resolve their problems.
- Under the auspices of Women Development Cell, various programmes are arranged for the girl students. A lecture by Dr. Harsha Hathi on Health Awareness is arranged every year. Workshops on tips on beauty therapy and other issues are also arranged.



- As per the University requirements and guidelines, our institution has a duly constituted Women Development Cell (WDC) which functions as the guardian against sexual harassment of women students. Prof. Caroline David is the convener of WDC.
- The Cell also informally functions at a personal level for the students as and when the need arises. Lecturers are arranged for gender sensitization formally in the classroom as per the curriculum in the Foundation Course.
- All the students are covered under Group Insurance Policy.
- For the safety of the institutional assets, the institution has appointed round-the-clock professional security guards.
- For the safety and the security of the students, faculty and institutional assets, the institution installed fire extinguishers at all strategic places.

5.1.12 Is there an anti-ragging committee? How many instances (if any) have been reported during the last four years and what action has been taken on these?

- The college has 'Anti Ragging Committee'. The rules for prevention & punishment are displayed in the college premises.
- College conducts an orientation programme for fresher's, wherein they are informed about what actions can be taken against the students indulging in ragging. They are also informed to contact their mentors/ authorities immediately if any such incident takes place, so that such erring students can be suitably dealt with.
- The staff is vigilant in the campus and CCTV cameras are installed to prevent such instances.
- This has led to make our college campus safe and free from ragging. No cases have been reported in the last four years.

5.1.13 Enumerate the welfare schemes made available to students by the institution.

- As per the University guidelines, the college has introduced a Group Insurance Scheme in which @ Rs. 20/- per student per year is paid as installment. Thus all the students are covered under the Group Insurance Scheme which provides insurance cover of Rs. 50,000/- per student per year.
- We have well equipped canteen facility on the ground floor, adjacent to the main building. The food items are provided at a subsidized rate.
- All the teachers and the Principal often have one-to-one interaction with the students which helps to solve their problems. This is how the counselling support system is provided. Our college appoints a qualified clinical psychologist on a regular basis who helps the students in various ways as well as gives them mental support.
- Annapurna scheme provides free breakfast to needy students.

The college provides:

- Financial assistance - concessions and merit scholarships to the needy and deserving students.
- Assistance to reserved categories students in obtaining freeships and scholarships from the State government.
- Assistance in obtaining 'Group Accident Insurance Policy.'
- Provides flexibility in payment schedule of fees to needy students.



- Travelling and daily allowances to all students participating in intercollegiate sports.
- Lecture halls to the students for study purposes beyond college hours.
- Concession in fees to deserving students.
- The IQAC has instituted a scholarship for a second year student on merit cum need basis.
- Also the IQAC has instituted Annapurna Scheme for the needy students.
- Other welfare measures have been mentioned in 5.1.4.

- The library is extensively used by the faculty and students in the teaching-learning process.

2. Research & Development:

Our College follows the policies, resources and practices as per the guidelines given by the UGC, University and the Maharashtra State Government. The College has a practice of giving paid leave and reimbursing the entry fees of staff members participating in Seminars, Conferences and Workshops arranged at State and National level. The Institution always encourages Research Activities. Our Library is subscribing to 15 Research Journals pertaining to Finance, Marketing and Human Resource.

- Research activities are promoted by providing opportunities to the faculty to participate and present research papers in seminars and workshops.
- Participation of the faculty in these activities is facilitated by providing them financial support and duty leave.
- The faculty is encouraged to register for M. Phil. and Ph.D.
- Those who have completed their Doctorate are encouraged to become Ph.D. guides.

3. Community Engagement:

The students have actively participated in the following programmes as part of their Social responsibility:

- Community Development activities such as Leadership Training, Community Development Workshop, Life skill education training, Blood Donation Drive.
- Health related activities such as Eye check-up, Self Defense Training, Red Ribbon Club Workshop.

- Activities promoting Responsible Citizenship such as Voter Awareness Campaign, Disaster Management Training, Save the Energy project, Road Safety.

4. Human Resource Management:

- Recruitment and Retaining of the Faculty Teaching Staff is recruited as and when the vacancy arises strictly as per the UGC, University and the State Government norms. College has the required number of qualified and competent teachers.
- Recruitment of Non-Teaching Staff Non-Teaching staff is recruited as per the circular from Maharashtra State Higher Education Resolution No. C/NGC/2299/4795 VS-4 dated 26th August, 1999.
- Recruitment of Faculty and Non-Teaching Staff for the Self Financing Courses is made by the Management and the Principal along with the subject experts from the College with proper interview of the Candidate.
- The eligibility criteria for employing part-time and ad hoc faculty are the same as that of full-time faculty. However, salary structure, workload and specialization differ depending on the courses and the requirements. Also vacancies of the Unaided Section are filled up by the Management and the Principal after interviewing suitable candidates.
- The institution follows the prescribed guidelines of the concerned authorities such as Government of Maharashtra, University Grants Commission and the University of Mumbai while recruiting the staff.
- The management ensures that there is no gender bias in recruitment of staff.
- The existing faculty and non teaching staff are deputed for faculty improvement and other training programmes.
- In addition to teaching, the faculty also plays an important role as members of various committees in the implementation of various plans of the college.
- Faculty and staff fill up annual appraisal forms.
- Non teaching staff is provided with in service training to enhance their skills. They are motivated to improve upon their educational qualifications. They are also encouraged to



participate in workshops and seminars. Improvements made in performance are rewarded in terms of recognition and promotion.

- Following facilities are provided to our Staff members:
 1. Financial Aid is provided to staff members on need basis.
 2. Children of staff members are given concession in fees in respect of admission in school and college of the Society
 3. Uniforms are provided to class IV employees.
 4. Well furnished staff room with separate wash-rooms for male and female teachers.
 5. Conference / Class room with Modern facilities like inbuilt Speaker System, White Board etc.
 6. Well equipped library with separate space for faculty having Computer and Internet facilities. Two computer terminals having internet access is dedicated to the use of the teaching staff members.
 7. Our library is computerized for the benefit of users. It subscribes Journals, Periodicals and all types of Newspaper- Local, State and National.
 8. College has a well-maintained Canteen offering fresh food at reasonable prices.
 9. The College also has well-maintained computerized functional office.
 10. The College has a well equipped multi-functional gymnasium.

5. Industry Interaction:

- Eminent persons from industry are invited to conduct seminars and guest lectures.
- Students are facilitated to visit commercial and industrial organizations for conducting research activities as part of their curriculum.
- Campus Placement drives is conducted in the college.

- ✓ The management information system (MIS) includes reports, committee meetings, functions, publications and discussions with all stakeholders.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

This Cell was established in the academic year 2004-05 and functions on the basis of the guidelines set forth by NAAC. It works towards improving and maintaining the quality of education, identifying and suggesting new ways of using teaching aids, developing suitable infrastructure and offering suggestions for the new self-financing courses. - ✓ The Institution has adopted Self-Appraisal Method to evaluate the performance of the faculty in teaching, research and extension programmes.
- ✓ The self appraisal system adopted by the college facilitates the staff members due for promotion under CAS
- ✓ At the end of the academic year every teacher is given Self-Appraisal Form. Self-Appraisal by teaching staff is mandatory. The form requires the teacher to give his/her self-evaluation of the academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular work done during that year. It also requires the teacher to enumerate the papers presented at conferences, seminars, refresher courses and orientation programmes.
- ✓ The staff are required to submit duly filled self -appraisal forms to the Principal through their respective heads of the department, course co-ordinators and office superintendent.



- ✓ The Departmental report filled by each teacher is also evaluated and it analyses the duties performed with respect to lectures completed as per the Teaching Plan and the number of lectures taken. The Institution uses the evaluation to improve teaching/ research performance of the faculty.
- ✓ The management rewards the teaching & non teaching staff by giving them Best Teacher & Best Employee Award every year.
- ✓ The Principal appreciates good performance by any faculty member and persuades the other faculty members to enhance their own performance in the interest of the Institution and self-development.
- ✓ Evaluation by the students and peers has also been adopted in our College which helps in teachers' evaluation and development. At the end of the term, the students are asked to assess the teachers' performance by filling up teacher evaluation forms.

6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

For the welfare of the Staff many measures have been undertaken:



- D.T.S.S. College Staff Welfare Fund Scheme has been introduced for the benefit of the Staff.
- The fees of College-going children of the Non-teaching staff is waived by the College.
- We have a practice of giving salary advance to staff members. Uniforms are given to all the class IV employees.
- In case of emergency medical treatment or for death in the family, advances are given to the class III and class IV employees.
- Once in two years, Traveling Allowance is given to the Staff members for their visit to native-place. This expense is borne by the College.
- Every year there is an annual get-together of the Management, teaching and non-teaching staff and all the employees of the Sanskar Sarjan Education Society. This helps in developing synergic work culture.
- Those who have achieved remarkable success in their career, published any research paper are recognized and appreciated by the Management. In addition, traveling expenses of teachers attending Seminars / Conferences are borne by the College.
- For the welfare of the staff every year medical camps, eye checkup camps, camps for the health care are arranged. Highly skilled and professional medical practitioners are invited.

Staff Welfare Scheme

1. The administrative staff is encouraged to visit places of historical interest. Each year, special leave is granted and the requisite amount is sanctioned from the Staff Welfare Fund for this purpose.
2. Under the Staff Welfare Scheme, the administrative staff members are granted Rs. 5,000/- p.a. by the management, from the year 2010-2011. There are currently 17 beneficiaries of the Scheme.
3. Under the Staff Welfare Scheme, the management had sanctioned a non-refundable grant of Rs. 12,000/- to Mr. Jayanti Patel in 2010, on account of the losses suffered by him owing to electrical short-circuit at his place of residence.

6. Under the Staff Welfare Scheme, the management had sanctioned a non-refundable grant of Rs. 5,000/- to Mr. Sudarshan Pawar on 13.6.2013, as financial assistance to meet medical expenses.

7. Under the Staff Welfare Scheme, the management had sanctioned a refundable grant of Rs. 1,00,000/- to Mr. Vilas Pednekar on 20.3.2015, as financial assistance to meet medical expenses for his brother's illness. The amount was refunded through monthly installments.
8. Under the Staff Welfare Scheme, the management had sanctioned a refundable grant of Rs. 1,50,000/- to Mr. Chandrakant Borle on 22.8.2015, as financial assistance to meet medical expenses for his wife's hospitalization and delivery. The amount is being refunded through monthly installments.
9. Under the Staff Welfare Scheme, the management had sanctioned a non-refundable grant of Rs. 70,000/- to Mr. Maruti Raul in February 2016, as financial assistance to meet medical expenses for his gall bladder operation and post-operative treatment.

This is how our entire financial / economic accounting system is under scrutiny and control.
- ✓ The faculty, who are practicing chartered accountants assist the college administration in the accounting and taxation related issues.
- ✓ The latest audit was done for the financial year 2014-15. There were no major audit objections. However, suggestions, given by the auditor for improvement are considered and complied upon.

The institution provides the necessary opportunity to the staff. The faculty takes effective measures and makes significant contribution in the quality enhancement of the institution. Our faculty and staff members participate in several seminars and workshops on issues relating to quality in higher education. Also, Administrative staff



attends training programmes for the same. Insights gained from such forums are shared with the faculty and other stake holders and implemented.

The College organizes workshops on a regular basis to impart skill based training to the administrative staff. In 2015-2016, hands-on training in Tally was given to the staff when the software was implemented for administrative work.

The staff is trained in the operational specifics of any new computer software that is installed for administrative purposes.

The staff is regularly sent to workshops in other colleges to develop their skill sets and soft skills. In 2014-2015, Mr. Pradip Potdar participated in one-day workshop for Non-Teaching Staff, 2014, organized by Joint Director, Higher Education, Mumbai Region, at Jhunjhunwala College, Ghatkopar, on 22 November, 2014. In 2015-2016, Mr. Pradip Potdar, Mr. Nitin Kotmire and Mrs. Pranisha Malgaonkar participated in a one-day state-level workshop on “Adding Life to Life at MD Shah Mahila College on 3rd February, 2016.

Thus participation of the faculty and the staff on large scale in training programmes enhances the efficiency and quality of the work while performing their respective duties.

2.	Four faculty members are Ph.D Research Supervisors. Five faculty members have obtained Ph.D degrees, three faculty members are pursuing their Ph.D research, and two more faculty members have cleared their interviews for Ph.D enrollment.
3.	Personality development workshops are conducted every year for the students by master trainers like Bhupesh Dave and other organisations (under the initiative of the Career Guidance Cell and the NSS).
4.	In 2014-2015 and 2015-2016, the College organized International Conferences with the help of funds generated from Mumbai University and JKT University.
5.	The Career Guidance Cell (Placement Cell) of the College is active throughout the year and it collaborates with various companies and training and placement agencies to guide, counsel, train and place the students in suitable positions.
6.	The College actively encourages the faculty to attend and present papers in national and international seminars and also to contribute research publications to reputed academic journals.
7.	The College Management has started its own publication unit for publishing academic research work with ISBN numbers.
8.	Whenever there is a vacancy, whether in aided or unaided posts, it is duly filled up as per existing rules and regulations.

Gender Audit

Gender audit is a process of assessing policies, practices and procedures in an organization that specially address the issue related to women. Gender Audit was undertaken at DTSS College of Commerce at Kural village, Malad(E) on April 25,2016.

Suggestions given:

1. It is suggested that in future the gender audit report of the SanskarSarjan Education Society's D.T.S.S. College of Commerce be presented in the form of of NAAC assessment criterion namely, Curricular Aspect, Teaching - Learning and Evaluation, Research, Consultancy and Extension, Infrastructure and Learning Resources, Student Support and Progression, Organization and Management and Healthy Practices. Information in the form of quantitative data pertaining to above mentioned NAAC assessment criterion would certainly help to assess over-all gender receptivity of the institution
2. Constitution of the internal complaints committee is required to be formed as per the provisions under: sexual harassment of women at workplace (prevention, prohibition and redressal) act 2013 and the subsequent UGC directives. Activities organised by the college WDC (CWDC) need to be adequately publicized in order to create an awareness of the aims and objectives of CWDC among all the stakeholders of the institution.
3. Further gender balanced staffing pattern is desirous for the unaided and self financing teaching staff as well as aided and unaided non teaching staff
4. Teachers may be encouraged to participate and present research papers at national international seminars on women issues.efforts be made to encourage women teaching staff to be members of University academic bodies and participate in academic decision making process
5. Girl students may be encouraged to take up training in fast expanding field of information technology.Remedial coaching may be provided to girl students to improve their academic performance in professional courses. Coaching facilities for competitive examinations like IAS,IPS,NET,SET,etc be provided to enhance career orientation of girl students
6. National /International /Local seminars/conferences may be organized on women issues.Workshops on gender,masculinity,sexual harassment etc be organized for all the stakeholders of the institution.Academic courses wherein women have natural professional preference like nursing,education,hospitality management etc may be given due consideration in future academic expansion of the college.

All other Furniture and equipments including Tables, cabinets, chairs, benches, black boards, telephone, spot lights, speakers, printers, fans, tube lights, cameras, intercom etc. on the college premises were individually verified and correctly accounted for.

Green Audit:

Green Audit was undertaken at DTSS College of Commerce at Kural village, Malad (E)during the month of July 2016 by Senergy Systems, Mumbai

Suggestions given:

- 1.Suitable capacitor panel banks needs to be provided for Meter no.- ST001707, ST-001710.As discussed with concerned , already 12 KVAR Panel has to be installed for meter no.-ST001707 , considering 10KW Load on that meter.
- 2.LT-II (a) commercial meters, ST-001706, ST-001708 should also be provided with suitable KVAR capacitor panels but in this case, using of this electricity in off peak hours can give energy saving at no cost using TOD benefit.
- 3.The possibility of replacing the fans with energy efficient new fans may be evaluated. These fans can save 30 to 40% energy while delivering similar air flows.The expected saving work out to about Rs 200/- per year per fan.
- 4.The carbon dioxide level is normal in almost area, excepts Ground and first floor. The standard norm is to maintain the level below 1000 ppm. It is suggested to provide



additional ventilation / fresh air fans to the respective areas. All these rooms are provided with AC. Hence, before starting the AC, adequate fresh air and ventilation should be provided or exhaust fans should be used in these rooms.

5. Before switching on AC units. Use of natural light in this floor has to be maximized.
6. The consumption of water is generally within the norms. It is also suggested to assess possibility of providing low flow taps at major locations.
7. Since, the terrace space of about 5000 sq. feet is available above 5th Floor, Rain water Harvesting proposal should be given a deep thought. Already BMC water is connected to underground tank and submersible water pump is being used.
8. Capacitor panel needs to be installed for reducing the loss of power. Since, except split and window AC, capacitor panel is not installed anywhere in college. The following steps may be initiated to further enhance efficiency of the systems:

An efficient power management system may be incorporated to:

- a) Switch off the display if not in use.
- b) Put the computer in Sleep mode / switching off the machines, if not used for prolonged period
- c) Optimize brightness of the screen
- d) Discourage use of screen savers, which has similar power consumption

Suggestions Implemented:

Sr No.	Suggestions Implemented
1.	The rooms which have AC, like the staffrooms, the administrative section, the computer laboratories, the Society Rooms and the Principal's Cabin, are adequately ventilated before the air-conditioning is switched on.
2.	Many times during the day, the windows of these air-conditioned rooms are kept open and the AC is switched off to optimize benefits of natural light and air.

- It is ensured that IQAC functioning is in the alignment of the requirements of external quality assurance agencies like NAAC, affiliating University, UGC and Joint Director's Office.



- The guidelines given by the Government of Maharashtra and University of Mumbai regarding permission for starting of new courses, proper utilization of government grants etc are complied

The institution plans and organizes the teaching learning evaluation schedule at the end of the previous semester. The results are analyzed and discussed at the departmental level. The Heads of Department discuss the results with the Principal. Results are also discussed in the staff meetings. This teaching plan is made by the faculty and discussed in departmental meetings. Extra lectures are taken when required. Suggestions given by the students regarding improvement in the teaching learning processes are considered and implemented by the faculty. The Heads of Department monitor the teaching learning process and analyze the feedback on it. They submit their report to the Principal and a copy is sent to the IQAC.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college.

- ✓ A College is the focal point of community activities, and also of nation-building, because the youth who come here today are the citizens and leaders of tomorrow. The college has a Self Help Group that conducts activities like preparing and selling paper bags, cloth bags; helping skill development in the students.

There are lively inter collegiate debates conducted on topics such as “Is the parliament effective without strong opposition?” and “Should taxes be centralized?” Also, quizzes on current affairs and general knowledge are conducted. To explore the artistic talent of students, a sketching competition on “Misuse of science” was conducted.
- ✓ This programme receives enthusiastic response from students and faculty across colleges.
- ✓ Field trips and industrial visits which have been organized, give an opportunity to students to relate theory to practice.
- ✓ Information Technology department conducts various workshops for students in the IT Lab. It also provides guidance to students of HSC regarding opportunities in science stream. Department also provides counseling to HSC science students regarding scope of science in career and career orientation.
- ✓ 'International Yoga Day' celebration was started since this year. The Yoga Techniques demonstrated have helped to increase their mental ability and physical fitness.
- ✓ With an emphasis given to gender issues, a self-defence programme has been organized for women students.
- ✓ The NSS and Rotaract Club encourage all the stakeholders of the college to maintain eco friendly environment in and around the college premises.

7.3 Elaborate on any two best practices:



CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS

- Keeping in with the demands of the market forces, college has introduced self financing courses in the subject Banking & Insurance, Accounting and Finance , Management studies and B.Sc.IT Students are encouraged to give Power Point presentation on socially relevant subjects by organizing competitions.
- The staff regularly attends workshops on Syllabus Revision and Paper Pattern organized by the University. Principal Dr. M S Kurhade is appointed as the Dean, Faculty of Arts , University of Mumbai and Dr. Sussmita Daxini is a Member of Board of Studies in Commerce.
- The College ensures that the number of lecturing days prescribed by the UGC is strictly met, and the teachers complete their portions as per the teaching plans. It also encourages a number of teachers to pursue their doctoral research, minor research and participate in the Refresher and Orientation Courses and Seminars and Work-shops to improve their skills. The College conducts the examinations on schedule.

CRITERION II: TEACHING – LEARNING AND EVALUATION

- The Accountancy Dept. undertakes practice tests at the T.Y.B.Com level in addition to the regular exams in order to improve the writing abilities of the students.
- The Commerce Dept. takes remedial coaching as per UGC norms.
- All the departments are distributing printed notes to the students for their benefit as most of them are from vernacular medium and economically disadvantaged sections.
- The Economics Dept. organizes Economics Day each year to attract students to the subject in an entertaining way.
- Department of IT organizes Industrial visits and job oriented programs.
- Computers Labs and Assembly Rooms are especially reserved for Power Point Presentation with the help of LCD (Liquid Crystal Display)
- Difficult subject matter is explained in a very simple language and even Marathi / Hindi language is used to explain the subject-matter.
- The College encourages teacher – friendly atmosphere which helps the students in becoming better performers in the examination.
- The Circulars concerning with examination, attendance record, list of defaulters are displayed on the notice-board. It helps in avoiding confusion during examination

CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION



- The College has a Research Guidance Centre which regularly organizes free seminars for research scholars and enthusiasts. Experts are invited as resource persons to increase the understanding of different aspects of research.
- The College is approved for Research Study Centres in Commerce and Accountancy.
- The College has five registered Ph.D. Guides.
- Out of 10 aided teaching staff, 6 have completed their Ph.D. and 4 are pursuing their Ph.D.
- In the last four years, 4 teachers have completed Minor Research Projects approved by UGC. In the current year, 3 teachers have submitted the proposal for Minor Research Project to UGC/ University of Mumbai.
- The teaching faculty is regularly engaged in attending and presenting papers at national and international seminars and conferences. The management and the Principal actively encourage the teachers to undertake major and minor projects, present papers at national and international conferences, and they provide necessary infrastructure and support for the same.
- Many of the teaching faculty is regularly publishing research papers in journals with ISSN and ISBN numbers.
- Prof. Chandrakant Borle provides consultancy services regarding computer systems and maintenance to JDT High School, SHAKILAM Institute of Agro Business Management, Surat.
- Prof. Shubhada Apte, C.A., provides the services to staff & college in terms of Taxation & to college for the UGC Certification free of cost.

CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

- Our College is an aided college permanently affiliated to University of Mumbai. Around 5000 students of Degree and Junior College have been using the educational facilities for the last 32 Years. The college is located at Kurar Village which is beyond Eastern Express Highway at Malad. The College mainly caters to the needs of higher education of these areas. This is the only College on the Eastern side from Andheri to Kandivali. The College is an examination centre of the University of Mumbai. Besides, the College is providing space to the Central and State Government Offices, Banks, etc., to conduct their examinations. The College has undertaken the following innovations in Infrastructure in the last five years:
- The College has constructed an additional floor, due to which the number of classrooms has increased.
- Computer labs with a capacity of 120 students with LCD and projector have been set up.
- Photocopy Machine Installed.
- Both Library & Office work have been computerized.
- Gymkhana with fitness centre has been built.



- Two Lifts installed for staff and handicapped students.
- The college has a six-story building with air-conditioned assembly hall for conducting Seminars with a capacity of 250 people with projector facility
- Two computer labs with a provision of 60 terminal, library with internet facility for staff and students, separate common rooms for boys and girls, separate rooms for NSS and Students' Council activities.
- The college proposes to have a separate building for self-financed courses in a near future.
- IT department is maintaining all computers in the campus.

CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

- Although our institution comes under Gujarati minority and 50% of the students can be admitted from the Gujarati community, however, the Institution supports the student community by admitting the students from SC, ST, NT, OBC and Open Category.
- The students are encouraged to participate in Intercollegiate and Inter- University extracurricular activities including sports and games.
- The College students have started The Rotaract Club of D.T.S.S College, which undertakes projects of social relevance. Students get the opportunity to interact with Rotaract members from all over the world at the International RAILA, which helps in personality development.
- The College has provided employment to a number of students in various capacities.
- The College has started Annapurna Scheme to provide nutritious snacks to under privileged students.
- The examination results are declared on the College website one week in advance of issuing of the mark sheets.
- Extension activities are carried out regularly by the Library, the NSS Unit., the NCC Unit., the Life Long Learning and Extension Unit and the Rotaract Club of D.T.S.S College.
- Every year meritorious students are given cash scholarships.
- The library committee selects many students for Book Bank and Freeship schemes.
- The reserved category students get Govt. of Maharashtra post-matric scholarships.
- ANGC scholarships are given to students from economically weaker sections.
- Scholarships are given to students from Minority groups from the Govt. of Maharashtra.
- The college provides a group insurance cover to the students each year.



- Rubella vaccine is administered free of cost to the girl students each year.

- The College is named after its founder **Shri. Dhirajlal Talakchand Sankalchand Shah**. The college is popularly known as **Sanskar College** or **D.T.S.S. College of Commerce**, a milestone which reflects the progress of Kurar village, in the 32 years of its inception.
- The vision of the college is to be a universally respected Institution, making quality the defining element of knowledge and education, sculpting principled and inspiring students to become good human beings spreading prosperity, peace, harmony and happiness around.
- The mission of the college is to make higher education accessible to more and more students so that they are able to face challenges of life with positive attitude, to give opportunities for learning to the students of socially backward areas without discrimination of caste, creed and community, to provide quality and excellence in education and to make students responsible citizens of the country.
- One of the main objectives of D.T.S.S College is to impart education with a particular aim to enhance students' knowledge and improve their skills in competitive markets.
- The College has taken initiative to ensure effective curriculum delivery through:

 - Planning, implementation and review of Year Plan.
 - Students' Feedback.

- The College conducts one conventional aided (Bachelor of Commerce - B.Com.) UG Programme. In addition to these, the College offers courses like B.Com.-Bachelor of Commerce, B.Com. (A & F)-Bachelor of Commerce (Accounting & Finance), Bachelor of Science (Information Technology), M.Com in Business Management, M.Com in Accountancy, B.Com. (B & I)-Bachelor of Commerce (Banking & Insurance), Bachelor of Arts (B.A.), Master of Arts (M.A.), Bachelor of Commerce (B.Com), Master of Commerce (M.Com)



– Business Management, Master of Commerce (M.Com) – Accountancy, Bachelor of Science (Information Technology), Master of computer Application.(MCA) and Bachelor of Management Studies.

- The institution organizes courses on personality development. Remedial coaching is provided for weaker, minority and reserved category students. In addition to the efforts stated above we also enrich the curriculum by giving the students the following additional coaching to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market like Resume writing, interview skills, Seminars exposing students to various professions, Mock interviews, Spoken English and Personality Development, Accounting Software packages, Remedial coaching, Alumni support by conducting seminars for enrollment in various courses in universities abroad.
- Well-equipped library with latest collection of text books and reference books, national and international journals and magazines. Further the library also provides high speed broad band internet connection where students can get access to additional information and knowledge pertaining to their subjects of study and its current developments.
- The institution makes special efforts to reach out to students who are differently-abled.
 - Teachers make a special effort to reach out to such students, motivate and intervene if they find such students are being isolated.
 - These students are allowed to use the elevators and separate toilets with a ramp to access the same.
 - A Wheelchair is made available and the college entrance has ramps for easy movement of handicapped students.
 - As per university examination rules, extra time and a writer facility is provided to the students who are differently-abled.
 - Special seating arrangements are made for such students.
 - The Government policy of 3% reservation for such students is followed.
- There is a newly-renovated and spacious auditorium where seminars are organized for the benefit of the students. Seminars, group discussions, projects, excursions and industrial visits help to generate the students' interest in the subject.
- As our college is located in the suburbs and is not very far from the centre of the city, the college gets good resource persons from reputed educational & professional institutions to interact with our students in seminars, workshops and guest lectures on topics which add value to the syllabus.
- Tech –world is a state level intercollegiate competition organized by the department of economics and foundation course. There are lively inter collegiate debates conducted on topics such as “Is the parliament effective without strong opposition?” and “Should taxes be centralized?” Also, quizzes on current affairs and general knowledge are conducted. To explore the artistic talent of students, a sketching competition on “Misuse of science” was conducted.
- The college has started a research center in Commerce and Accountancy that has been started to enable the faculty and the students to pursue research



activities and facilitate implementation of the research schemes and projects. The college is also recognized as center for M.Phil.

- The Guidance Centre regularly organizes free seminars for research scholars and enthusiasts. Experts are invited as resource persons to increase the understanding of different aspects of research. The college has a well defined policy to promote research.

- The innovative and interactive sessions have generated an increasingly positive response and D.T.S.S. College Research Guidance Centre looks set to be a guiding light for aspiring research scholars of the area, and proposes to expand its scope and reach in the coming years.
- The Principal and Heads of the Departments with the help of the administrative staff of the Institution, ensure effective implementation of reforms by:
 - a. Conducting the University examinations, strictly according to the norms prescribed by the University
 - b. Assigning separate examination seat numbers
 - c. Strictly following the system of centralized assessment



- e. Declaring the result well within the stipulated time by the University.
- We have formed Grievances Redressal Cell as per the University requirement. We follow all the instructions given by the University, such as,
 - a. Allowing the students to apply for marks verification.
 - b. Giving the photocopy of the answer book to the students who apply for it.
 - c. Allowing the students to apply for reevaluation.
 - d. Taking the opinion of the Committee constituted for the purpose to ascertain whether the candidate who has applied for reevaluation has any merit or not.
 - e. Getting the answer book re-assessed (if recommended by the Committee). The result of evaluation is communicated to the candidate concerned.
 - To develop critical thinking and inculcate research aptitude of the students, they are given assignments. Post -Graduate students are required to submit project assignments as a partial requirement for their degree. External Examiners are invited to evaluate the assignments. Reference books and journals are purchased for the students and they are encouraged to refer to them for their assignments. These initiatives promote research culture among students.
 - The college faculties who have obtained their Ph.D. and fulfill required criteria to be a research supervisor are providing guidance to research students in the University as well as at the research centre.
 - The college has been taking several initiatives to attract researchers of eminence to visit the college on various occasions and interact with students and faculty. They have motivated students and faculty to undertake research projects through their discourses. A major step by the institution to inculcate research aptitude among the faculty and students is to establish a University of Mumbai recognized Research Centre in Business Policy and Management. Various eminent researchers have been invited to share their expertise
 - The Principal conducted the research on problems of higher education. His research findings have been useful to the Principals and higher education administrators and he has been providing his expertise to many colleges. The college has earmarked around Rs.1,50,000/- p.a. of the total budget for research, which is completely utilized towards books and research journals, organizing seminars, workshops and conferences etc.
 - Six of our faculty members have completed Ph.D. research work and three are pursuing research work for Ph.D.
 - Campus recruitment drives are organized wherein the organizations make presentations about their -functioning and needs, conduct aptitude tests, group discussions and personal interviews as part of their selection process.
 - The college makes conscious efforts to promote institution-neighbourhood-community network through various activities conducted by the NSS unit. The National Service Scheme (NSS) unit organizes various activities for spreading awareness about social issues among the local community. A unit of Department of Life Long Learning and Extension (L.L.E.) is actively participating in the college from past few years.



- College has signed MOUs with the colleges affiliated with university of Mumbai namely, Hinduja College , D.A.V College, Shailendra College and J.M.Patel College.
- The college NSS and rotaract club undertakes various students projects in collaboration with with 4 international, 22 national and 11 others NGOs. However there is no formal agreement made with these institutions.
- D.T.S.S. College Of Commerce Has Organized An International Conference On India Calling—A World Of Opportunities (Initiate, Integrate, Innovate) and an International Conference on Multidisciplinary Research On “Global Uncertainty: A Great Opportune Moment for Indian Economy”. Also National Conference to create awareness about Gujarati Literature was organized by Gujarati Sahitya Mandal.
- The college follows a policy of continuously upgrading the infrastructure in the premises in order to facilitate the environment for effective teaching and learning.The college has been making enhancement to existing infrastructure as per requirements of increasing academic needs and as per the guidelines of the affiliating University and Government.
- To meet this demand, and after taking proper permission from the Municipal Corporation of Greater Mumbai, the College has recently added two floors which have 12 classrooms. Two elevators have been constructed to enable easy access to the higher floors.
- Separate offices for I.D.O.L., Students’ Council, LLE, , N.C.C. and N.S.S. ,separate Common Room for Girls, Separate office for Examination Section, Conference Room,Separate office for Research Centre.The college campus is spread over an area of 2684.60 Sq. Ft & open ground of 620 Sq. Mts.
- The college has 20 spacious lecture halls. The lecture halls are well ventilated with comfortable seating arrangement for students Each classroom has a facility to connect to an Portable LCD and document camera as and when required. An air-conditioned auditorium with a seating capacity of 250, a stage and an audio-visual system to carry out curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. The college has two well-equipped computer laboratories with sixty eight computers and with all required licensed software with LAN and internet facility.
- Though the College does not have its own health care center, it has appointed a psychologist to provide counselling to students. The College NSS unit regularly conducts eye check up Camps & other Health Camps. There is also a provision for emergency insurance available for students. Also, some of the trustees of the College are associated with Mahavir Clinic adjoining our College, which provides access to emergency medical treatment if required. Thus College has sufficient facilities at hand to address any emergency.
- The college arranges for Thalassemia detection camp, Blood Check-up for our students and staff members. The college, in association with the Rotaract Club of DTSS College, arranges for free rubella vaccination for female students each year. Regular fumigation is ensured to keep campus malaria and dengue free. The institution has a website namely “www.sanskarsarjan.org”
- The college publishes its updated prospectus every year at the beginning of the academic year. It is also made available on the college website to make it publicly accessible.
- The Career Guidance and Placement Cell of the College not only gives guidance to the students to shape their career for higher education and placement assistance but it



also extends guidance towards building up the confidence of the students for self-employment and starting up their own ventures. The Cell organizes lectures/seminars by inviting professionals from industry.

- The administrative staff is encouraged to visit places of historical interest. Each year, special leave is granted and the requisite amount is sanctioned from the Staff Welfare Fund
- for this purpose.
- Civil Services Cell was started in D.T.S.S. College from 20/11/2012 in the academic year 2012-13. The main motivating force behind starting this Cell, in our College, is our respected and beloved Principal Dr. M. S. Kurhade, who is the Chairman of this Cell.
- Give counselling to students regarding opportunities of higher education and job options available for their course of study. Arrange lectures and seminars inviting academicians and industry professionals to create awareness of the current market trends, placements and new courses. They also advise on the additional skills required in industry.
- As part of the continuing focus on students' welfare activities, the College had appointed a psychological counselor to help the students deal with personal, academic and stress-related problems.
- Our college regularly organizes Career Mela which helps the students to know the opportunities of Career, Professional Courses and Placement. In our Self Financing Courses i.e. B. Com (Banking & Insurance) and B. Com (Accounting & Finance) ,B.M.S..B.Sc.ITspecial efforts are made like giving them on-job training and arranging for industrial visits to help them to prepare themselves for the future.

- The institution has the following action plan for its future development:

 - An additional division of F.Y.B.Com. is proposed.
- Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) Cell was established in the academic year 2004-05 and functions on the basis of the guidelines set forth by NAAC. It works towards improving and maintaining the quality of education, identifying and suggesting new ways of using teaching aids, developing suitable infrastructure and offering suggestions for the new self-financing courses. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell has been diligently involved in helping the Management and the Principal and the other committees by offering valuable suggestions and effective measures to maintain consistency.
- College has a Cell known as Women Development Cell (WDC) to prevent sexual harassment of women staff and this Cell also Organizes programmes regarding women's issues for the women staff and students and attends to the problems relating to women staff. The Cell is functioning quite effectively. Prof. Caroline David is the convener of WDC
- The Institution has adopted Self-Appraisal Method to evaluate the performance of the faculty in teaching, research and extension programmes. The self appraisal system adopted by the college facilitates the staff members due for promotion under CAS. At the end of the academic year every teacher is given Self-Appraisal Form. Self-Appraisal by teaching staff is mandatory. The form requires the teacher to give his/her self-evaluation of the academic, co-curricular and extra-curricular work done during that year. It also requires the teacher to enumerate the papers presented at conferences, seminars, refresher courses and orientation programmes.
- The Final Accounts of the College are audited every year by our Qualified Chartered Accountant. There is an Internal Audit, Statutory Audit and Government Audit.
- The college has undertaken academic audit in the month of January 2015. Green Audit was undertaken during the month of July 2016 by Senergy Systems, Mumbai. The Administrative audit was recently done on 17th March, 2016. Gender Audit was undertaken on April 25, 2016.

GENDER AUDIT REPORT OF SANSKAR SARJAN EDUCATION SOCIETY'S D.T.S.S. COLLEGE OF COMMERCE

Gender audit is a process of assessing policies, practices and procedure in an organization that specially addresses the issues related to women. It is an exercise to evaluate the gender responsiveness of an organization and how well the gender perspective been institutionalized at the individual, work unit and organizational level. The gender audit outcome aims to assist the organization to become more gender responsive.

The Sanskar Sarjan Education Society's D.T.S.S. College of Commerce, Kurar Village, Malad (E), Mumbai, carried out the Gender Audit exercise on April 25, 2016, to establish the outcome of its gender positive initiatives in the policies, programmes and practices of the college. The Gender Audit team is pleased to present this report on its observations regarding the efforts of D.T.S.S.College towards mainstreaming gender sensitivity on college campus.

First and foremost, the Gender Audit team appreciates the initiatives taken by the Sanskar Sarjan Education Society's D.T.S.S. College of Commerce in volunteering for a gender audit. We acknowledge the cooperation of college authority, teaching staff and administrative staff who provided us with appropriate and candid information during our visit to the college. We also thank them for bearing with us during the critical interrogation sessions of the audit process. Our special thanks to Principal Dr. Kurhade and the members of Women Development Cell of the college, for their support throughout the audit process and enabling us to successfully complete this important task.

THE GENDER AUDIT PROCESS

The gender audit process was undertaken at two levels. Firstly, a copy of the 'Gender Audit Report 2015-16' of the college was given to the members of the gender audit team prior to the visit. The report contained in detail the basic information about the gender sensitive features and

initiatives of the D.T.S.S. College. At the second level, the gender audit team visited the college to validate the claims made by the college in its gender audit report. During the visit the gender audit team interacted with the principal and the members of Women Development Cell and N.S.S. unit of the college. The gender audit team critically authenticated the information shared by the principal and teaching staff during these meetings.

GENDER POSITIVE FEATURES OF D.T.S.S. COLLEGE

The gender audit team is pleased to state that the college has noteworthy gender sensitive features and has undertaken several gender positive initiatives to make the campus gender inclusive. The Management of the D.T.S.S. College and the principal along with his teaching and non-teaching staff deserve great compliments for this. The observations stated below are based on the two level gender audit process carried out by the team.

1. The Gender Profile of the senior college teaching and computer section staff, as well as the gender ratio of the incoming students indicates an encouraging degree of gender balance. Gender balance in enrolment of students at entry and final year levels is particularly noteworthy for traditional faculty of Commerce as well as professional faculties such as B.Com. (A & F) and B.Com. (B.M.S.).
2. The college has effectively implemented various schemes to promote academic progression and excellence of students such as Government Freeship Scheme for girl students, Government Scholarship for SC/ST/OBC/VJNT students, Meritorious Scholarship, Book Bank Scheme, Association of Non-Government Colleges Scholarship, Management Freeship Scheme and Academic Awards. Achievement of girl students in receiving freeship and scholarship is particularly noteworthy. Shri. Giteshbhai Pranal Majlani Annapurna Scheme of the college providing healthy and nutritious breakfast to poor students deserves special mention, considering the neglect of dietary needs of girls in our society.
3. The gender audit team members appreciate the efforts taken by the college towards enforcement of the Prevention of Sexual Harassment Act, and the steps taken in forming the Women Development Cell (WDC). The initiatives taken by the WDC, along with other associations of the college like the NCC and NSS unit, in enacting various gender-affirming activities throughout the year are helping the college to achieve its aim of gender equality

and gender sensitivity. Special mention must be made of the free drive to provide the girl students with rubella vaccine, which helps to prevent unfortunate natal and maternal fatalities in the future as well as conducting thalassemia awareness programme. Women's leadership training programmes are organized to create awareness about finance, health care, law and to promote their leadership qualities. Various extension activities like Self Defense, Life Skill Education, Save the Girl Child etc. are organized in collaboration with NGOs like AKSHRA, Stree Mukti Sanghatana and YASHE.

4. The college is well equipped with basic infrastructure and amenities to take care of health, hygiene, recreation and safety of women staff and girl students. There are well maintained washrooms, changing room facilities, common room and gymkhana facilities for girl students.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE GENDER AUDIT TEAM

Currently three important sources provide guidelines to ensure gender positive environment on campuses of higher education institutions. These are, firstly, the NAAC assessment updates on Gender Sensitive Quality Indicators, secondly, recommendations of the taskforce, set up by the University Grants Commission (UGC), in "SAKSHAM" report on 'Measures for Ensuring the Safety of Women and Programme for Gender Sensitization on Campus', and thirdly, provisions in the 'Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition And Redressal) Act, 2013. The recommendations made by the gender audit team here are founded on the abovementioned sources.


1. It is suggested that in future the gender audit report of the Sanskar Sarjan Education Society's D.T.S.S. College of Commerce be presented in the form of NAAC assessment criterion namely, Curricular Aspect, Teaching-Learning and Evaluation, Research, Consultancy and Extension, Infrastructure and Learning Resources, Student Support and Progression, Organization and Management and Healthy Practices. Information in the form of quantitative data pertaining to above mentioned NAAC assessment criterion would certainly help to assess over-all gender receptivity of the institution.
2. Constitution of the Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) is required to be formed as per the provisions under 'Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 and the subsequent UGC directives. Activities organized by the


college WDC (CWDC) need to be adequately publicized in order to create an awareness of the aims and objectives of CWDC among all the stakeholders of the institution.


3. Further gender balanced staffing pattern is desirable for the unaided and self-financing teaching staff as well as aided and unaided non-teaching staff.
4. Teachers may be encouraged to participate and present research papers at national-international seminars on women's issues. Efforts be made to encourage women teaching staff to be members of University academic bodies and participate in academic decision making process.
5. Girl students may be encouraged to take up training in fast expanding field of Information Technology. Remedial coaching may be provided to girl students to improve their academic performance in professional courses. Students may be encouraged to pursue Ph.D. level research in topics related to women's issues. Coaching facilities for competitive examinations like IAS, IPS, NET, SET, etc. be provided to enhance career orientation of girl students.
6. National/International/Local seminars/conferences may be organized on women's issues. Workshops on gender, masculinity, sexual harassment etc. be organized for all the stakeholders of the institution. Academic courses wherein women have natural professional preference like Nursing; Education; Hospitality Management etc. may be given due consideration in future academic expansion of the college.

II. Executive Summary

The premises were evaluated against the various criterions laid down by The National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC). The major observations are

1. Lighting & Ventilation

- a. The usage of natural lighting has been maximized.
- b. The possibility of replacing conventional ballasts with electronic ballast and / or replacing the present light fitting with LED lamps may be evaluated, especially for lamps operating for longer period and while making new purchases.
- c. The air ventilation needs to be improved for most of the class rooms and other premises; excluding those on the Ground and first floor. The concentration of carbon dioxide was observed to be higher at most of these places; implying inadequate fresh air intake. It is suggested to provide additional fresh air through windows, fresh air / exhaust fans.
- d. The fans with standard efficiency have been provided wherever required. However, possibility of replacing the fans with high efficiency super fans may be ascertained; especially while making new purchases.
- e. The fans & lights are switched off when not in use.

2. Water Quality & Conservation

- a. The water supplied by the Municipal Corporation is directly used for drinking; which is a common practice in and around Mumbai.
- b. Water coolers are provided at convenient locations.
- c. The water consumption is generally within the norms.

3. Waste Management

- a. The generation of waste is minimized through use of electronic communication and effective water management system.
- b. The sewage water is disposed of through Municipal system; this is a common practice in and around Mumbai municipal area.
- c. The solid waste is disposed of through Composting facility provided near the canteen with the help of college volunteers.
- d. E waste is also taken care of by dismantling spares by students for self-learning and giving the assembled PC for reuse to the surrounding needy people.

4. Infrastructure usage

- a. Movement on-campus is both way. Thus, provision of emergency exit is available.
- b. The parking space available. Nonetheless, parking space has been provided for faculty and senior persons. Most of the commutation is through public transportation.

- c. There are few fire extinguishers located at key areas. The cylinders are being refilled on time. Also, training is imparted to the members of safety committee for operation of fire extinguishers.
- d. Fire Hydrant system is already in place up to 5th floor. However, it is suggested to train the Disaster management team and security people for operation of the system at all floors.
- e. The draining system for washrooms is efficient and effective.
- f. No seepage problem observed in the premises.
- g. Green IT culture
 - a. Energy efficient computers and monitors are already purchased. However, Suitable capacitor panel should be provided to all 4 meters. It is suggested to put 12 KVAR capacitor panel for 10 KW load which is operated on meter no.-ST001707 after discussion with concerned people. Same way suitable capacitor panels must be installed for ST001706, ST001710 in phase wise manner to save on ele. bills.
 - b. In most of the cases, the computers are switched off, when not in use.
 - c. Energy efficient air conditioners with star rating have been procured during recent purchases.
 - d. The air conditioners are switched off, when not in use.
 - e. The performance of the air conditioners was observed to be as per standard norm.
 - f. Electronic communication is encouraged to minimize usage of papers.
 - g. The papers need to be reused for double sided printing to reduce the consumption of stationary thereby helping the environment.

Potential Saving Area:

Major savings can be achieved by

1. Changing over to category IX (Educational Institutes) from Category III (Commercial)
2. Replacing conventional ballast with electronic ballasts for all tube lights.
